PARAISE INN. Mount Rainier National Park, July 6.—By a special party, seeing the body of Forest Guardian of Seattle, lying at the bottom of a crevasse on Ingraham glacier, Mount Rainier, made its way over the icy slopes of the mountain today. The party was led by Charles Brown, a park ranger.

WILBUR MAY STOP HERE EN ROUTE TO INSPECT PROJECTS

There is a probability that R. L. Wilbur, secretary of the interior, will spend some time in Medford within the next few days, accompanied by Horace M. Albright, the new head of the national parks service, en route to Portland, where they are scheduled to arrive on their next formal stop. From that city the secretary will proceed to Oregon, to inspect the Vale and Grey reclamation projects, and Mr. Albright will return to Yellowstone National park, of which he was former superintendent for years.

Mr. Albright and Judge Alex Sparrow are fast friends dating from the time the latter was superintendent of Crater National park and the former of Yellowstone park, hence it is reasonable to presume that Albright will stop in Crater Lake with Secretary Wilbur for a short visit with Sparrow, especially as Messrs. Wilbur and Albright are traveling by motor and would not doubt travel to Portland over the Pacific highway.

The secretary and the chief of the park service will spend three days at Crater Lake. It is understood here, before starting north. They motored up from Lassen National park to the Klamath Indian reservation for a business visit by the secretary with L. D. Arnold, superintendent of that reservation, and a conference with some of the Indian congress leaders. They were scheduled to motor up to Crater Lake today from the reservation.

DAIRY INSPECTION NOW FUNCTIONING

The city dairy inspection service is now functioning, although the details have not yet been worked out, according to C. W. Austin, newly appointed dairy inspector. All milk distributors will be required to have a license under the new system. The license blanks are now being prepared, and the public will be notified of the steps necessary to receiving a license when they are ready.

"It is hoped that the inspection service will be in an advisory capacity," said Mr. Austin. "The main thought is to cooperate with the producers and help them as well as the consumer."

Mr. Austin will go to the north-west part of the state, the last of next week to study the methods and results in cities that are operating under a license similar to the one Medford requires under the new system. Mr. Austin will be gone a week and expects to obtain detailed information on how their systems are operated.

INCLUDE MEDFORD AS AIRSHIP BASE

The following telegram was received this afternoon from J. C. Allen, attached to Senator Charles L. McNary's staff, dated at Washington, D. C.:

"Senator McNary has just been advised by Admiral Moffett of the Airship board, that Medford will be included in the itinerary of the airship base board, and proposed site at Medford will be considered by the board."

The date of the arrival of the airship board here is indefinite. The message assures this city that its application as a dirigible base will be accorded official recognition.

The Fourth of July vacation period which Oral McLaughlin of Cottage Grove, who works in a lumber mill, was spending in Medford and vicinity was an eventful one for that young man, and winds up with him spending three days in the Jackson county jail before he can depart on his motorcycle for work again Monday.

All because, while spending on the Jacksonville road yesterday afternoon, his motorcycle ran into the one-horse wagon of a fruit vendor, upsetting the wagon and the driver suffering bruises. City Traffic Precort later placed McLaughlin under arrest and the case came up in Judge Taylor's court today, inasmuch as McLaughlin was without any money to pay a fine, having gone broke over the Fourth, it proved a puzzling one for the judge as McLaughlin was scheduled to go to work Monday noon at his Cottage Grove employment.

If the court fined him he would have no money to pay the fine, and would have to serve it out in jail. If the court suspended his motorcycle license McLaughlin would have no way of getting back to his job.

TEN FOKKERS FOR LOCAL AIR ROUTE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Charles V. Kakin, president of the West Coast Air Transport, announced today that ten tri-motored Fokker planes, each capable of carrying 14 passengers and two pilots would be placed in service between Seattle and San Francisco this month.

Kakin's announcement followed information that a group of Southern California capitalists, said to be headed by James Talbot, chairman of the Fokker Aircraft board, had obtained control of the West Coast Air Transport.

The president said there would be no change in the personnel and the planes, cost \$78,000 each.
