RECOVER BODY OF CREVASSE VICTIM BY HELP OF ROPE

PARADISE INN, Mount Rainier National Park, July 8.—(AP) A deep crevasse on Mount Rainier which for six days had been the tomb of Forrest Greenhouse of Seattle was empty today with the recovery yesterday of his body from a narrow foothold on the mountain into the great crack in Ingraham glacier.

Charles Browne, park ranger, was lowered into the crevasse. The rest of the party held the line, perched on a ledge of ice 100 feet below the opening of the crevasse. When Greenhouse's body, standing upright was freed, it was thrown fifty feet further down the hole by a cable, but Browne had attached a rope to the exposed part of the body and it was recovered. His leg was broken and one ear mangled as though to protect the head.

PASSENGERS SAFE IN SEA COLLISION

BOSTON, July 8.—(AP) —The steamship Prince George, bound from Yarmouth, Nova Scotia for Boston, with 249 passengers, was in collision with the coast guard patrol boat Agassiz in a dense fog 6 1/2 miles east of Boston light yesterday.

All passengers were safely transferred from the Prince George to the Agassiz and only one, Miss Seretha Nickerson of Greenwich, Conn. was injured. She was slightly bruised after the accident. The Prince George's 10 lifeboats were lowered within 15 minutes after the alarm was sounded and the ship put about and came alongside the Agassiz. Gangplanks were rigged and the passengers, many of them with all their baggage, made their way aboard the patrol boat.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR URGES WORLD COURT

KANSAS CITY, July 8.—(AP) A resolution urging the United States senate to take action to enter this country into the world court of international justice and to ratify the Inter-American treaty of arbitration was adopted last night by the delegates to the thirty-second annual International Convention of Christian Endeavor.

"We believe that the United States, in order to make effective its pledges under the pact of Paris should become a member of the world court of international justice and respectfully hope that without delay the senate of the United States will complete this relationship," the resolution stated.

ALBANY BOY DROWNS WHEN HIT BY CRAMPS

JEFFERSON, Ore., July 8.—(AP) —Marvin Dyer, 29, of Albany, was drowned in the Santiam river near the Jefferson bridge about 5 o'clock this afternoon. The body was recovered about an hour later and taken to Albany. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Dyer, former Jefferson residents, who were notified of his death, while they were at the coast.

Dyer apparently was seized with the cramps and called for help. Don Davis of Jefferson, attempted a rescue, but was dragged down twice by the struggling youth.

COMILLAS A PORT OF FISHING BOATS, LEAPS TO RENOWN

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—

The Yellow Bird has added the village of Comillas to Ver-sur-Mer, Eisleben, and Llanelli, as out-of-the-way places brought into the spotlight of world news by the landing of trans-Atlantic airplanes from America," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

Comillas shares fame with Comillas, for it was to that important coastal town of northern Spain that the fliers were taken by automobile after their landing, and it was from Santander that the telegraphic news of the completion of the trans-ocean flight sped out to the world.

Comillas lies about 30 miles west of Santander along a rugged coast washed by the waters of the Bay of Biscay. It is a village of only 2700 inhabitants, and its tiny port can accommodate only the fishing smacks and small carrying boats that ply the local waters. All along this northern coast of Spain are mountains and rugged hills, many of which project into the sea, forming little hill-girt bays and coves. Some of the small bays have been almost filled with sand. It was on such a sand-filled little bay near Comillas—Gyambre beach—that the Yellow Bird came to earth.

If a coincidence, the fliers, in landing in the vicinity of Comillas, terminated their flight near a city which has already served as the goal of a trans-Atlantic contest in speed and navigation. In 1928 the international yacht races which started in New York came to an end in Santander harbor. This year Santander will be the terminus for similar races starting at Southampton, England.

Visitors Mostly Spaniards. "Santander's port opens off the Bay of Biscay 20 miles west of the better known resort, San Sebastian, and 120 miles west of Biarritz. Although Spanish brought to its beaches to escape Madrid's summer heat, Santander is little known abroad. "The town is progressive, modern, prosperous, and therefore is not sought out by tourists in search of ancient landmarks. However, between a sun-scorched, crumbling cathedral and a sun-washed sandy beach, the Spaniards prefer the beach. "Hidden From the Sea "Santander cannot be seen from the sea. It has been built deep within the harbor behind a mountainous peninsula which shelters the homes of 7,000 Santander dwellers from Bay of Biscay storms. It consists of Pueblo Alto, with an undistinguished cathedral rising in its head, and Pueblo Bajo, where liners and coastal steamers land their passengers, and freight boats take on red Camargo iron ore for Britain's blast furnaces. Santander takes a leading place among the north coast ports shipping ore from the many Spanish mines in the Asturian provinces. "Over the ridge that protects Santander from storms lies the Sardinero, the favorite play or beach—a long, warm arm of reddish-yellow sand embracing a bright blue sea. Many costly villas look upon the Sardinero. "The citizens of Santander recently presented to the royal family of Spain a summer palace, 'La Magdalena' on a headland near the city. It has come to be recognized as one of the most beautiful of the royal residences. In recognition of the Spanish king's love of sport, the palace was equipped with a bathing bench, a yacht landing, tennis courts and a polo field."
