

'UNTIN' BOWLER BELIEVED HELD IN STORM PATH

Chicago Tribune Plane Unreported Since Friday—May Have Been Forced Down in Canadian Wilds—Bad Weather Blamed.

OTTAWA, July 8.—The amphibian airplane "Untin" Bowler, took the air today from an undetermined point in the Hudson Bay country, continuing its flight from Chicago to Berlin.

CHICAGO, July 8.—(AP) "Somewhere in Canada" was the most definite address today of the Chicago Tribune's Chicago-to-Berlin amphibian plane, the "Untin" Bowler, and its crew of three who were last heard from early Friday.

Since 9:58 a. m., Friday, no message has been received from the plane. At that time Parker D. Cramer, co-pilot and navigator, radioed that the "Untin" Bowler was landing at Great Whale, in the Hudson Bay country.

Fears were expressed yesterday that the Bowler had been forced down in the wooded hills of northern Quebec by storms which are known to have crossed its path, but Tribune officials were confident, they said, that the plane had met with no accident, but had probably been kept to the ground by unfavorable weather.

The "Untin" Bowler left here Wednesday morning on what was to have been a five-day flight to Berlin to chart a new commercial air route to the Old World.

BEAN FUNERAL TO BE HELD TUESDAY BURIAL IN EUGENE

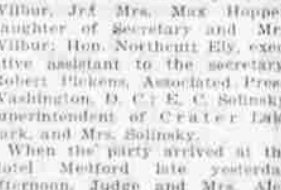
