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KLAMATH'S FIELD CLOSE QUARTERS FOR OREGON SHIP

The whereabouts of "The City of Portland," monoplane, first commercial airplane ever built in Oregon, was the cause of considerable uneasiness throughout the state, due to its schedule today. A telephone message from the Herald at Klamath Falls stated that the ship had difficulty in taking off on the Klamath Falls airport at 6 o'clock this morning, so the cabin was relieved of its passengers and the pilot, Vance Breese, builder, left alone for the north.
