

### USE YARDSTICK OF PROTECTION ON TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(AP)—President Hoover today advised Senate Republican leaders to apply the yardstick of "adequate protection" to the pending tariff bill.

The tariff was discussed at a White House conference today, attended by Senators Watson of Indiana, the party leader, and Reed of Pennsylvania, second ranking Republican on the finance committee, and two outstanding protectionists.

The Republican chieftains would not commit themselves afterward on what effect would be on the tariff measure by the application of the rule laid down by the president.

The house bill received almost unanimous Republican support.

Senator Watson said the president wants a "sane and sensible" tariff measure. Whether the president considers the house bill "sane and sensible" was not disclosed.

The senators would not say either that Mr. Hoover was displeased with the house bill.

However, the view was held at the capital that the Republicans who control the senate finance committee would work for a readjustment, more or less extensive, of the house measure.

### EQUITY SUSPENDS FIVE ACTORS FOR WORK IN TALKIES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 11.—(AP)—Frank Gilmore, president of the Actors' Equity association, told the Associated Press today that a rumored strike order by the organization was "nothing more than a rumor."

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 11.—(AP)—Five actors were suspended and two others reinstated by the Actors' Equity association in meeting here last night, it was announced by Frank Gilmore, president.

While no statement was made as to the cause of the suspensions, it is understood they resulted from making contracts with talking motion producers without sanction of the organization.

The suspended were Tully Marshall, Anders Randolph, Raymond Hatton, Louise Dresser and Henry Otto.

The action was interpreted to be the first move of Equity in its demand on producers here recently that only contracts from paid-up members of the association be accepted by them.

The leading members of the industry here made a flat refusal of the demand, insisting that the open shop would continue.

Rumors, the source of which could not be located, were current yesterday that the Equity association planned a preliminary strike by setting today as the last time in which members can appear as extras with non-talking picture production work. Producers maintained that the proposed walkout would include insufficient members to cause embarrassment.

Equity officials refused to comment on the reports.

### JAIL BREAKER GIVEN LIFE AS AN "HABITUAL"

EUGENE, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—Harvey Rice, 34, who with seven other prisoners escaped from the Lane county jail Sunday but was recaptured, was sentenced to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge G. P. Shipworth today under the habitual criminal act.

A jury returned a verdict identifying Rice as the same individual previously convicted five times in the circuit courts of Oregon. Rice was taken to the Salem prison this afternoon.

The two convictions proved by the state are: Douglas county, 1904, grand larceny; Lane county, 1912, burglary not in a dwelling; in Malheur county, 1927, burglary not in a dwelling; in Lane county, 1927, livestock theft; in Lane county, 1929, burglary not in a dwelling.

### MRS. TINGLEY OF THEOSOPHISTS IS DEAD IN SWEDEN

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, July 11.—(AP)—Mrs. Katherine Tingley, 79, noted theosophist leader, died today at Visingso after an illness which followed a motor accident in Germany recently.

Her right thigh bone and left ankle were broken May 29 when the automobile in which she was riding swerved from the road near Osnatruick and crashed into a concrete bridge.

She recovered sufficiently to be released from the Osnatruick hospital and instead she was taken to Visingso, the headquarters of the Swedish theosophist community.

She had a crowded lifetime and was prominently connected throughout, particularly in her later years, with theosophism in its world wide aspects. She resided at various times in Cuba, the United States, and in Europe.

### SALEM MECCA FOR CATHOLICS IN CONVENTION

SALEM, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—With the arrival of the special train from Chicago and St. Louis at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, the 73rd annual convention of the Catholic Central Society of America and the National Catholic Woman's Union will open here, the first time the two organizations have met farther west than St. Cloud, Minn., or San Antonio, Tex.

William Eibner of New Ulm, Minn., national president and other national officers, will arrive on the special train, according to the latest advices.

General participation of Oregon Catholics in the convention will take place Sunday when Catholic day will be observed at the state fair grounds. Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, D. D., archbishop of Portland, will be celebrant at the pontifical high mass in the open air at the fair grounds at 10:30 Sunday morning. More than 15,000 people are expected to attend the high mass.

Women of the various church organizations in the county will serve dinners and lunches at the fair grounds at noon and a program of speeches and music has been arranged for the afternoon. Amplifiers have been put in place to assure clear audition for the immense crowds expected.

### SWEDISH AIRMEN AGAIN FORCED TO ABANDON VOYAGE

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, July 11.—(AP)—Advices received here from Iqvitut, Greenland, state that Captain Albin Ahrenberg and the crew of the airplane Sverige reached Iqvitut at 6 o'clock this morning in a motorboat after landing at Kingnait bay from Reyjavik, Iceland.

The word from Iqvitut was that Captain Ahrenberg encountered increasingly bad weather and decided to fly along the Greenland coast. Perceiving that they would be unable to continue to Iqvitut, the Swedish airmen made an excellent landing in the dark and lit fires to attract attention.

These heroes were notified by the motor boat Quarto, which put in and took them safely to Iqvitut. They intended to return to Kungur as soon as possible to fetch their machine.

Iqvitut, which is in latitude 61 north, is about 100 miles or so

around the corner of south Greenland, Cape Farewell, and was used as a supply station for the Sverige. Mount Kumpait is on the north shore of Arak Flord and is outside the firch near Iqvitut.

### DRAGNA'S RACQUET WINS LAURELS IN SECTIONAL MATCH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—Mel Dragna, Seattle star and former University of Washington varsity player, was the new Pacific northwest sectional tennis champion today after he defeated Ross Hocking, Victoria, B. C., yesterday in straight sets, 6-1, 6-4, 6-4.

Dragna's victory ended the sectional feature of the 21st annual Oregon state net meet, which officially ends Saturday. Doubles, junior and boy's titles of the northwest were settled earlier in the day.

By winning the title, Dragna took possession of much silverware and was given the right to enter any northwest or California tournament. He had not decided today where he will play next.

Two Jericho club, Vancouver, B. C., youths, Ozy West and Gordon Shields, won the doubles crown for the third successive time by eliminating two Portlanders, Bob Johnson and Don Lewis.

Merion Kynes, Seattle, won the junior championship from Bob Rhine, Portland, in a four-set struggle, 6-3, 6-5, 2-6, 6-1, and Henry Rosenberg, Tacoma, took an easy victory from H. Goodrich, Portland, 6-2, 4-6, for the boy's title.

### FLOODS CONTINUE HAVOC IN KANSAS, GYPSUMITES FLEE

TOPEKA, Kans., July 11.—(AP)—Heavy rains, which have proved a serious handicap to the Kansas wheat harvest, continued today as many swollen streams rose higher and families of two towns returned to their flood-swept homes.

Gypsum, Kans., was swept by a flood when Gypsum and Spring creeks poured down on the town. Alarms were sounded and all residents escaped to safety.

Every stone building was flooded and 70 per cent of the homes were surrounded. Most of the residents rushed to the nearby hills in automobiles.

Parts of Newton, Kans., were inundated yesterday when another flood swept down the Sand creek valley. Many cellars were flooded.

### MYSTERY MALADY TAKES SIX LIVES IN LUMBER CAMP

SAPPHIRE, Ariz., July 11.—(AP)—Six persons were dead today at a little lumber camp smugling in the Graham mountains 35 miles from here, victims of an illness the cause of which is yet unexplained. A seventh victim was believed to be recovering from an attack of the same malady.

Meager reports sitting down from the mountain fastness last night told of the deaths of William Evans, 45, and an eleven year old boy named Powell, after Evans' four year old daughter had died earlier in the day. Three boys had succumbed previously.

The seventh person stricken, referred to in the reports as "Frenchy" was said to have successfully fought off the deadly malady. Two of the victims were ill only fifteen hours, while the others died within forty-eight hours of the first attacks.

Dr. W. H. Pratt, county health officer, said the symptoms resembled cerebrospinal meningitis.

### IMPLICATE HIGHER-UP IN CHINESE DRUG RING

SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.—(AP)—Ratifications of a purported international opium smuggling ring were being traced by government officials here today as they awaited instructions from Washington regarding Mrs. Susie Ying Kao, wife of the suspended Chinese vice consul here, in whose baggage a fortune in opium was found last Monday.

Investigators last night announced that "incriminating evidence" had been found in Mrs. Kao's personal baggage, which was opened after the opium had been found. This was said to have implicated "a high official" in the Chinese consulate here.
