

DEBUTANTE HIT BY CAR NEAR DEATH

Resort to Blood Transfusion to Save Life of Dorothy Wilson, Daughter of Wilson Brothers Director—19-Year-Old Helen Hertz Charged With Reckless Driving.

CHICAGO, July 11.—(AP)—A blood transfusion was performed early today to save the life of Miss Dorothy Wilson, debutante daughter of Milton Wilson, a director of Wilson Brothers, manufacturers.

Miss Wilson was critically injured yesterday when the motor car was struck by an automobile driven by Miss Helen Hertz, 19-year-old daughter of John Hertz, former president of the Yellow Cab company. Miss Hertz faced charges of assault with a deadly weapon, and is at liberty on her own recognizance.

Physicians said Miss Wilson's condition was "grave," but that she was holding her own early today.

Evansville police were told that Miss Hertz drove through a stop light, ramming the Wilson car. Both machines were wrecked. Miss Wilson and her chauffeur were taken to a hospital, although the latter was not seriously hurt. Miss Hertz was accompanied by a chauffeur, but was driving at the time of the accident, police said.

At the police station Miss Hertz was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and her bond was fixed at \$800. She was released on her own recognizance at the recommendation of William O. Freeman, Evansville chief of police.

Chief Freeman said that should Miss Wilson's injuries prove fatal, the charge against Miss Hertz would be changed to manslaughter.

Miss Hertz gave her home address as Leona Furness, Gary, Ill., where her father and mother maintain a racing stable which includes the one-time Kentucky derby winner, Regal Count.

Miss Wilson made her debut in North Shore society last winter. She has been living in Santa Barbara, Cal., with her parents. Her present visit here was at the home of her grandmother, Mrs. E. Crane Wilson.

Miss Hertz' parents learned of the accident while they were attending the races at Arlington Park.

MALE TENNIS AGE IS CONQUERED BY CALIFORNIA MISS

LONDON, July 11.—(AP)—Miss Helen Wills showed a select and keenly interested gallery, including the Prince of Wales, how easily she is able to beat even a first class male tennis player, when on a private court in the west end of London she defeated Captain Victor Cazale, M. P., by scores of 6-2, 6-4.

Captain Cazale, former amateur squash rackets champion of Britain and a renowned tennis player, was no match for the woman champion of three nations. The Mail, describing the match, says she played as if merely toying with him and ran away with the first five games before she allowed the captain to win two, after which she promptly ran out the set. In the second set Helen allowed the score to reach four-all, before running out.

Miss Wills' opponent declared he struggled his hardest, but his efforts were unavailing as "she was too good."

This is not the first time Miss Wills has defeated a ranking male tennis star. A match with Fritz Mercier, one of the best American players, at Forest Hills last summer, which was won by the woman champion aroused considerable discussion and was followed a few days later by a return match which Mercier won. Mercier said later that as long as he played a best court game and traded drives with Miss Wills she was more than a match for him.

BRUINS DISPLAY NO FEEBLENESS AGAINST GIANTS

Rumor That Cubs Cracking Refuted By Performance in Opener at Polo Grounds—Pirates and Phils On Homer Spree.

Reports that the Cubs were cracking seem to have been exaggerated, or distorted. Fresh from two larrupings by the Braves in four games, the Chicago contenders stepped into the Polo grounds yesterday and cracked curves and fast ones up against the walls with such abandon that the Giant out-petrol ran itself dizzy in no time at all. The Bruins won the opener of the five-game series by the modest score of 6 to 2, but it seemed like an Irish mile.

Turned back in the first assault, the Giants now face the necessity of winning all four of the remaining games if they are to displace the Cubs in second position in this series. Meanwhile, the Pirates will be gambling in Baker bowl with the Phillies, whom they defeated yesterday by 15 to 5 in a home-run orgy.

The Buccaneers now lead Chicago by one and one-half games, and the chances for either the Giants or the Cubs to gain in the immediate future are slim.

The Pirates hit five home-runs in Philadelphia and the Phillies four. This total was within one of the record of 19 for two clubs in a game, set at the same Baker bowl in 1922 when the Phils hit six and the Cardinals four. Grand slam led with two, and Traynor, Lloyd Warner and Passell of the Pirates and Klein, O'Doul and Southern of the Phils got one each.

William Watson, Clark outpitched Jess Haines and Fred Frankhouse by just enough to enable Brooklyn to win the opener of its series against the Cardinals by 9 to 6.

The Reds punched the Braves by 10 to 2 at Boston in the opening of Jack Hendrick's personal campaign to escape from the cellar.

Alphonse Thomas defeated the Yankees for the second time in his major league career, plunging the Huggins camp into gloom. The score was 6 to 3.

The Athletics won the opener at St. Louis by 4 to 1, when Howard Ehmke turned in a two-hit game against Sammy Gray, but the Browns got even in the nightcap. George Walling and Eddie Rommel failed to hold Howley's boys, and the home team won by 7 to 5.

The day's campaign added a technical half-game to the Mackinnon lead, which is now eight games. The Yanks are only one and one-half contests ahead of the Browns.

Cleveland rallied sharply to defeat Washington by 9 to 7, climbing one notch above the 500 mark.

Marty McManus hit another homer with the bases filled, and the Tigers defeated the Red Sox by just that margin, 10 to 6.
