PIRATES' LEAD IS EXTENDED TO TWO OVER CUBS

Battle of Coogan's Bluff Aids Buccaneer Aspirations—Robins Turned Back in First Division Hope By Cardinals.

The crucial battle of the Polo grounds is being conducted to the complete satisfaction of the Pirates, who have yielded not one inch of ground since they overhauled the Cubs Independence day. The Pirates and the Giants split a tedious double-header beneath Coogan's bluff yesterday as the Pittsburgh rough riders stamped the Phillies once more at Baker field.

The Pirates added half a game to their lead by tossing the Phillies 4 to 2, while the Cubs were winning and losing. The half-game gain was registered in the all-important games-lost column where until yesterday the Buccaneers were on even terms with Chicago.

The Pirates now lead the Cubs by two games, and the Giants by five and one-half. The situation of the New Yorkers is even worse than the figures indicate, as they have lost eight games more than Pittsburgh and seven more than Chicago.

Freddie Fitzsimmons was capped for eleven hits and was poorly supported in the opening yesterday, and the Cubs had little difficulty in winning by 3 to 1.

Defeated in the opener, John McGraw still had the courage to toss Bill Walker, the southpaw, against a team which had not fared to a left hander since the venerable Clarence Mitchell had a good afternoon eight weeks ago.

The Giants finally won 15 to 12. Melvin Ott outlived the two-hour and fifty minute performance with his twenty-first home run, increasing the margin by which he leads both leagues. Hank Wilson added with his twenty-first and twenty-second. Loumer homered twice, while Lindstrom, of the Giants and English of the Cubs.

Ervin Beane turned in a five-hit game against the Phillies. One of the five drives was a home by Hurst, but this was more than counterbalanced by circuit blows from the bats of Traynor and Paul Waner.

Red Lucas shut out the Braves by 6 to 0, giving further proof of the seriousness of Jack Hendrick's intention to quit the cellar.

The Robins bowed to the Cardinals by 6 to 3 at Ebbets field, receiving a check in their attempts to crash the first division.

Rain halted all important activity along the western front in the American league yesterday.

The game that was played in Ernest Bernard's league saw the Red Sox tame the Tigers by 15 to 8 as the Senators downed the Indians, 9 to 1. The Red Sox victory was notable for a ten-run inning by the light-tapping Cariggins. Marty McManus helped the Tigers save their faces with two more home runs. Dale Alexander hit one.

Billings, the Detroit pitcher, Alexander and McManus executed a triple killing of Red Sox in the seventh, while Alexander cut in with an unassisted double play in the ninth.

THE HAGUE, July 12.—(A) The Dutch courts have granted an absolute divorce to Mrs. Henry H. Rogers from her husband, H. H. Rogers, Standard Oil executive. The two are parents of Millicent Rogers Ransom, the former Countess Palm.

The divorce was obtained in the district tribunal at Utrecht June 28, on grounds of infidelity. The divorce became effective July 2, the great secrecy having surrounded the entire affair and the final trial disposing of the official summary in the court records here.

SEE NO CONFLICT IN JUDGE SALARY LEGISLATIVE ACT

SALEM, Ore., July 12.—(A) Attorney General Van Winkle has written opinion in reply to inquiries by district attorneys of the state holding that there is no conflict between two acts of the 1929 legislature, one providing for the collection of certain fees to pay him and the other raising uniform fees to be collected for court documents filed with county clerks.

The act increasing judges' salaries provides that when any suit is filed the county clerk shall collect \$2 in addition to all other fees, and \$1 from each defendant appearing separately in such suit or action. These fees are to be turned over to the state to be applied to the judges' salaries.

Later in the session an act was passed providing a uniform fee of \$8 for all counties to be collected from the plaintiff, appellant or moving party, except in probate cases, and \$4 to be collected from the defendant or respondent. Under the old law the fees varied in the counties.

Although the uniform fee act was passed subsequent to the other, it is held that both acts are to be enforced as passed.

SALUTE TO DEAD FOR SUB VICTIMS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 12.—(A) The British navy has said its good-bye to the 21 men who went to death in the sunken submarine, H-17.

Just at sunset last night the minny battleship Rodney led six destroyers and five submarines over the spot where the submarine went down Tuesday, after collision with the H-17, and rendered impressive last honors to the men 300 feet below them.

A short memorial service was conducted aboard the Rodney, wreaths were cast into the sea, and the big guns of the battleship and her auxiliaries boomed in final salute to the gallant dead.

The admiralty announced that in view of the certainty that the men were dead further salvage efforts would be abandoned.

ASHLAND SWEET SHOP IS BOUGHT BY KANSAN

The Nelson Sweet Shop in the Emory building in Ashland, formerly owned by Ed Nelson, has been sold to Roy L. Clark, formerly of Bendville, Kan. The sale, made by the Charles A. Wing Agency, Inc., at Medford, is the second time the shop has changed hands this year.

RALPH HURST IS SERIOUSLY HURT BY WILD TRUCK

REES CREEK, Ore., July 12 (Special).—Ralph Hurst was seriously hurt about 7 p. m. Wednesday, while en route to Eagle Point from beyond Battle Falls where he had loaded shakes for W. C. Clements. Mr. Hurst was traveling at a moderate rate of speed when he arrived at a point known as Rocky hill, for some reason he lost control of the truck. D. Whaley having had a similar experience on the same truck once before, jumped from the machine and stopped at a nearby rock crusher where he found Joe Moorman, who drove in pursuit of the truck, overtaking it on a curve near the Funk ranch where Mr. Hurst had hit an obstacle near the road and gone over the grade.

Mr. Whaley, being the first to arrive at the scene of the accident, had managed to free the injured man from the wreckage when two cars of the Eagle Point Irrigation district containing Ted Moorman, Elmer Robertson, Scott Hoyer, M. Heckenberger, Clarence Greb, William Merriam and Prof. Davies, who helped to carry him to one of the cars where he was taken to the home of William Marrian to await the arrival of an ambulance ordered from Medford by W. C. Clements, who was then on his way, accompanied by the parents of the injured man, to the scene of the accident.

At this writing it is not known what the extent of the injury is, except he seems to be hurt internally and suffering much pain.

Mr. Hurst is the son of William Hurst of Eagle Point, where he is well known.
