

HEAVY DAMAGE MAY POSTPONE IS SEEN AFTER DEDICATION OF EL PASO RAINS LOCAL AIRPORT

Cloudburst Hits Exclusive Residence District—Wall of Water Sweeps Into Streets—Autos Smashed Against Houses.

EL PASO, Tex., July 12.—(AP)—El Paso today surveyed wreckage and ruin in the wake of one of the most disastrous cloudbursts in the history that hit an exclusive residential district yesterday.

Damage was estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

Without warning, a solid blanket of water was released from clouds over the Franklin mountains on the edge of town. A wall of water swept into the streets, carrying huge boulders.

The stone foundation of one house was swept from under the building. Parked wagons and automobiles were pinned up by the current and smashed into holes and buildings. Chunks of asphalt pavement were torn up and carried away.

Trains were delayed, but service today was normal and clearing away of debris was under way.

DEVIL'S LAKE, N. D., July 12.—(AP)—Eighteen persons were injured, thousands of dollars in property damage and telephone and telegraph communications interrupted in a tornado which struck this city, Cary and Ardock last night.

John and Frank Vanderlyn, farmers living near Cary, were severely injured when a barn was demolished, and George Jacobson, farm hand, suffered a broken leg.

Fifteen laborers were injured, some seriously, when eight cars of a Great Northern railway work-train were blown from the rails near here.

BULL FACTION CELEBRATES IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP) With a violent lull in the market and several of the industrial, particularly steel, the bull party celebrated the first reduction in brokerage loans since late May on the stock market today.

Although the reduction was but \$14,000,000, it was interpreted as indicating that the gain of about \$45,000,000 during June was due largely to the exercise of rights to heavy new security offerings.

The upturn, which took about two weeks of issues up to more than twenty points to record levels was too violent to hold, however, and considerable profit-taking broke out in the early afternoon when the bears launched another drive on the market.

The late buying converged on the principal stocks, among which were United States Steel, American Van American Telephone, Allied Chem., Radio, Public Service of New Jersey, Montgomery Ward and International Telephone. The selling of stocks and oils stopped and the market absorbed the week end trading well. The close was strong. Sales approximated 4,800,000 shares.

SOVIET AGENTS ARE KICKED OUT OF MANCHURIA

SHANGHAI, July 12.—(AP)—Official Chinese announcements said that 142 Russians, officially or unofficially connected with the Moscow government, had been deported from Manchuria within the last 12 hours.

They left all their belongings behind them.

PEKING, China, July 12.—(AP)—C. T. Wang, Chinese foreign minister in his first statement regarding the crisis in Manchuria, declared the nationalist government was determined to stamp out communism and would not tolerate soviet propaganda in any form.

"We are not timid to soviet Russia," he said, "positively we are not unfriendly to Russia."

"We are thoroughly determined not to tolerate soviet propaganda in whatever form it may appear."

"After the raid on the Harbin consulate by the Manchurian authorities we deemed it necessary to take steps to prevent further spread of propaganda. The documents seized at Harbin also contained the names of Russians were violating their agreement."

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 12.—(AP)—The seventy-fifth anniversary today of the birth of George Eastman, found the camera magnate going through his regular routine, despite his declaration five years ago that he was to adopt a new program in which leisure was to play a large part.

To the man who founded and built up a \$100,000,000 corporation employing nearly 25,000 workers, birthdays are no different than any other.

"I don't care for any fussing on my birthday," he said. "I will not allow my daily routine in any way."

GRAND OLD MAN OF THE POTOMAC DEAD

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Captain Ith Luskett, who began life as William Edward Lutrett and became the "grand old man of the Potomac," is dead at the age of 74.

In his career of more than 50 years as a river pilot, he was ultimately a long line of presidents and other government dignitaries, visiting kings, princes, generals and statesmen, and the youngsters of many celebrated families.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—(AP) Funeral services for Mrs. Ellen Eivers, 67, prominent Oregon club woman and active in state American Legion affairs, who died late Thursday at her home here after a brief illness, had not been announced today.

Mrs. Eivers was born in Tipperary county, Ireland, and in 1882 she married in Liverpool, England, 150 years later she came to Portland.

She was one of the first nurses in St. Vincent's hospital here and was well known throughout the state for her part in aiding the aged who were veterans. She is survived by eight children.
