KIWANIS HEAR OF CAR CARAVAN AND ELKS CONVENTION

Carl Y. Tengwald, who attended the national Elks convention at Los Angeles last week, and C. E. (Pop) Gates, who just returned from a caravan trip with the Redwoods Empire association through the state of California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, were the two principal speakers at the Kiwanis club luncheon this noon. Both gave interesting accounts of their experiences.

Mr. Tengwald, among other activities, was ca-dee'd, just five feet away from the Angeleno endurance flight plane, when it made its perfect landing near Colver City Friday. He gave a splendid word picture of the flyers and their reception, together with the activity on the scene. Returning to the city of Los Angeles after the landing, Mr. Tengwald saw the crowd gathered around the closed doors of the Pan American bank, which failed there on the same day.

The purpose of the caravan trip of the Redwoods Empire association through the northwestern states, is to unite this part of the country more closely in spirit and activity, according to C. E. Gates, who with Governor Patterson, was placed at the head of the party.

A rousing welcome was given the caravan in every city visited along the way, climaxed by a big reception in British Columbia, which was described interestingly by the speaker.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—With traffic deaths mounting annually to staggering totals, child fatalities during school hours are being reduced in many cities where school safety patrols have been organized.

The safety patrols sponsored by American Automobile association, Kenneth Hoover of Harrisburg, Pa., who was injured rescuing a child from the path of a car, received a medal. Others went to Arnold Hurd, Bladensburg, W. Va., and Robert Greter, Charleston, W. Va., for similar acts.

Nearly all of the cities where patrols have been organized report marked reductions in child traffic fatalities during school hours, and several Washington motorists, have not had such a death recorded in more than two years.

While the automobile association attempts to make no definite claim as to the number of lives saved, it cites the fatality reports of the various cities as evidence of the effectiveness of the patrol system.

There have been numerous instances of life saving by the school boy patrolmen, however.
