

TRACK FOLK ARE ROBBED IN CHICAGO

Race Horse Owner and Party Lose \$22,000 in Jewelry and Money to Bandits—Car Halted En Route Home From Races—Strip Jewels From Women—Robbers Escape

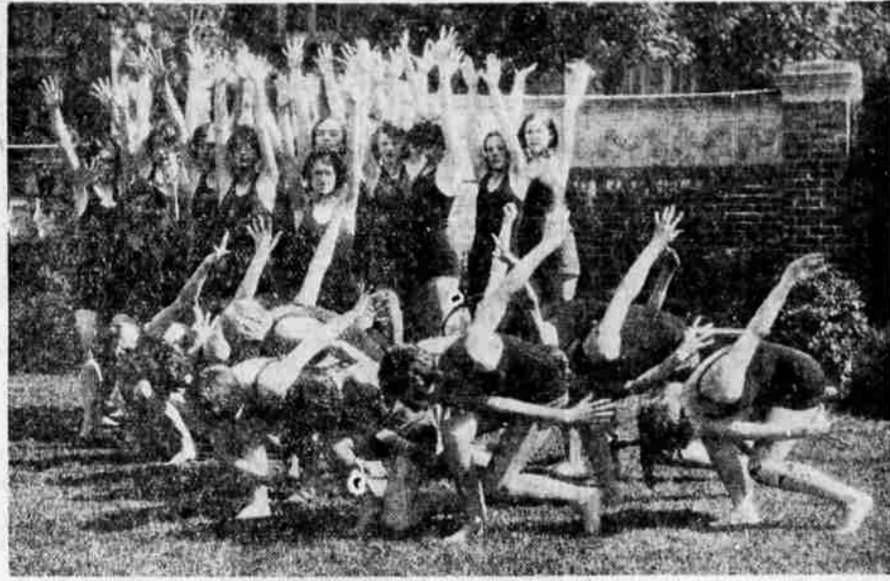
CHICAGO, July 18.—(AP)—Three robbers, late yesterday, stole \$22,000 in jewelry and money from Frederick Grabner, race horse owner, Mrs. Grabner and Mr. and Mrs. Ruel J. Seigel, their companions.

The carefully planned and well executed robbery took place while the Grabners and Seigels were returning from the Arlington Park race track.

Grabner, owner of "Windy City," winner of this year's American derby, had just turned off the crowded main highway onto a gravel road to evade traffic congestion, when a large sedan, bearing three men, blocked his path. Two men, brandishing pistols, got out of the car, entered the tonneau of the Grabner machine, where the women were, and ordered Grabner to drive on. The robbers' car followed close behind. One robber stripped jewelry from the women, while the other robbed the men of jewelry and money. Mrs. Grabner set her loss at \$10,000, Mrs. Seigel at \$9,850, and Seigel a three-carat diamond ring valued at \$1,500. Grabner lost \$200 in cash.

Warning the party to make no outcry, the robbers directed Grabner to drive back onto the highway, still crowded with hundreds of machines. Seigel, despite the pistol prodding his back, managed to open the car door with his foot, and when the traffic procession was halted by a train, he leaped from the car and ran toward a bus.

The two robbers jumped from the car, pistols in hand, and pursued him, but made no effort to fire. They then jumped into their own car, which was close behind Grabner's and were driven swiftly away down a side road.

Seigel told police that when the robbers' car passed the bus as it was fleeing, one of the robbers aimed a shotgun at him.

DING DOND DELL MINERVA CHEEVY FELL INTO WELL

CHICAGO, July 18.—(AP)—A horse with the high faluting name of Minerva Cheevy fell in a well yesterday, being rescued after much to-do and with great difficulty.

Minerva Cheevy, who pulls a man plough on John Nohor's farm near Libertyville, was standing in deep thought on some boards covering the well. The boards had seen their best days. They broke dropping Minerva Cheevy 15 feet into a lot of water.

The water was over Minerva's head and the nag was in imminent danger of drowning. A man jumped in to the rescue. In the excitement his name was not learned. Whoever he was, he jumped in.

The man and horse floundered around for a while until finally the man made connections with the halter the animal wore. A rope was dropped down and the halter strap was made fast to it. After which the rope was pulled taut so that Minerva's head was held above water.

In this unnatural, but necessary posture, the horse remained until the Libertyville fire department got there. It was decided to pump the well dry, and this was done. A belt was then placed around Minerva, a crane was brought forward, and the horse was hoisted to safety.

Minerva Cheevy today was back on the front of a cultivator.

KNOW POISON OAK AND AVOID PANGS ADVICE OF BOARD

Vacationists, campers and hikers through the Oregon woods are warned by the Oregon state board of health against the danger that lurks in the rhus radicans or diversiloba or "poison oak." The plant, the leaves of which appear in clusters of three, may well give pause to all those who are tramping in the country, says a recent bulletin. It is worth while for every out-of-doors person to know how to recognize this plant so that he may be able to distinguish between vegetation that is friendly and those plants and vines and other growing things that should be avoided.

Poison oak is one of the worst offenders, as the growth of this creeping, clinging and climbing vine is particularly abundant. But you can avoid it if you will remember that poison oak is really distinguishable from other vines by its three leaflets. The plant is a shrub which grows wild in this state. It may lay prostrate upon the ground, though it will climb shrubbery or trees in sunny locations. It may grow erect with a self-supporting stem. The leaves

have a peculiar satiny appearance. The flowers are greenish yellow and are followed by small drupeaceous pale green smooth fruits, borne in loose bunches.

The dermatitis-skin poisoning that is caused by poison oak, which is not an oak at all, is due to an irritative resinous substance in the sap of the plants. Some of the conditions under which poisoning can occur from this plant are in dispute.

While cases of poison oak can be usually traced to direct contact with the plant itself, it is quite possible to be affected indirectly for the sap can be carried on fur or bodies of animals, on farm implements, golf sticks or balls, on clothing, shoes and even in smoke coming from the burning branches of this plant. Some cases of poison oak have been traced to bonfires fed by heavy tenacious branches of this plant.

When one is known to have come in contact with poison oak, especially one who is known to be susceptible, washing the hands as soon as possible with a good lather of an alkaline soap is of some benefit since the poisonous resin is not soluble in water and can not be removed by that alone. Itching and redness are the first symptoms of the dermatitis which may be delayed for a day or several days. If you have these symptoms you should consult your doctor in order that he may be able to tell you what to do next.

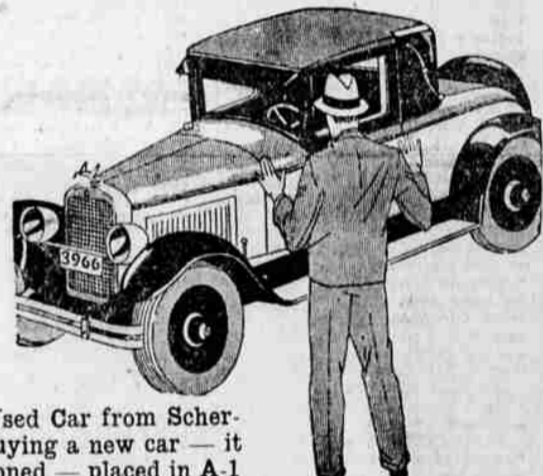
