GROUND POWER WIRE SETS FIRES

When the Copco transmission line to Prospect broke at 6 p. m. yesterday about one mile northeast of the McCloud bridge and fell, the grounded wire started two lively blazes a mile apart, each of which burned over a half acre of brush and trees, and in addition started about 50 other small fires wherever the wire touched, and which small affairs were easily extinguished by District Fire Warden Phipps' crew of seven men before the half acre fires were gotten under control at 8 o'clock last evening.
