FINAL CALL VICTIM WAS TO SINNOTT WITCH SAYS OF OREGON HEX KILLER

Former Congressman and Court of Claims Jurist Stricken Today While Resting in Home at Washington, D. C.—Beloved for Public Deeds.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(AP)—Justice Nicholas J. Sinnot, of the United States court of claims, died today.

Mr. Sinnot formerly represented Oregon in the house, and was appointed to the United States court of claims by Calvin Coolidge in 1928.

At his home it was said that Judge Sinnot had not been in good health recently. He was stricken suddenly while resting at his home and died a few minutes later.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—Nicholas John Sinnot, who died in Washington, D. C., today, was for many years representative from the Second Oregon district.

At the opening of the 66th congress, Sinnot was appointed chairman of the very important committee on public lands.

GIRLS ESCAPE JUVENILE REDS BROMLEY SAYS DEATH TRAP OF NEW YORK PACIFIC FLIGHT SEASIDE BEACH HECKLE SCOUTS EASY FOR SHIP

SEASIDE, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—Three Portland girls, who were thought to have been drowned last night when caught by the tide as they were walking along the beach off Tillamook head, were rescued today after they had spent the night in a treacherous "death trap" in a severe rain and electric storm.

The girls were Helen Sherer, 19; Daisy Farah, 19, and Betty Taney, 20, all of Portland.

Although they suffered acutely from the severe cold weather, the girls were uninjured.

The three young women yesterday afternoon set out to walk along the beach from Seaside to Tillamook head. Toward evening they discovered the rising tide had cut across their path...

POWER AT WORK TO AVERT WAR AID BOARD GOES SLOW ON POLICY

Great Britain, France, U. S. Seek to Break Manchurian Tension by Friendly Advice—Belligerents Conscious of Pact Obligations—Border Crossings Denied.

By the Associated Press. The great powers today were working actively to avert war in Manchuria between China and Russia...

Both China and Russia announced they were fully conscious of their obligations under the Kellogg pact and intended to observe them...

China and Russia disavowed any intention of invading the other, but it was clearly recognized that border incidents constituted the chief danger to peace.

French consular authorities at Shanghai said that Harbin reports told of Russian troops crossing the Manchurian border at the eastern end of the Chinese Eastern railway.

Previous dispatches that this was the case met with denial in Moscow and there was no authentic information that either China or Russia had invaded each other's territory.

Russian dispatches told of a rush of workers to join the Red army to defend the union against "China."

Nankin reports in London indicated that the Chinese minister in Finland would go to Moscow in order to discuss the situation with the Soviet government.

American officials at Washington expected the Kellogg pact to exert a profound influence toward peaceful settlement of the controversy.

Chinese Kuomintang news agency dispatches made public in New York denied that the seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway meant that similar action would be taken against other foreign interests in China.

BEACON LIGHT INSTALLATION BEGINS MONDAY

Construction work on the installation of power lines to sites for beacon lights for air mail flight between Delta, Calif., and Drain, Oregon, will start today.

The work will take six weeks, and for the most part is in mountainous country.

The government will install electric beacons on the summit of the Siskiyou, instead of gas beacons, as originally intended.

The sites of beacons in California are: La Moine, Flume Creek, Danvers, Shasta (Black Butte), Weed air port (Hogwood), Gazelle, Yreka, Black Mountain, Hornbrook.

Trio Spend Night in Bathing Suits On Narrow Ledge—Tide Creeps Near As Heavy Rain Falls and Lightning Crashes.

NEW YORK, July 20.—(AP)—Fifty boys and girls, carrying banners announcing themselves as members of the Young Pioneers of America, a communist organization, marched to the Cunard docks this morning and joined 237 Boy Scouts who sailed on the liner Samaria to attend the Scouts' world jamboree in England.

The demonstration delayed the liner's sailing 20 minutes. Police who tried to disperse the young demonstrators were attacked by the girls in the parade.

The young pioneers staged their demonstration just as the Scouts were boarding the vessel from the dock. One banner denounced the Scout movement as being "supported by the bosses to create cannon fodder."

The Scouts marched aboard ship and then lined the rail to watch as the police tried to disperse the demonstrators.

RUM PATROL ON RIO GRANDE IN MEXICAN AMBUSH

EL PASO, Texas, July 20.—(AP)—Ivan E. Scotten, 25, a patrol inspector in the border patrol, was shot and killed today when a party of six riddled him with a party of large group believed to be Mexican rum runners, on San Elizario Island at a point called Los Pontas on the Rio Grande.

Scotten and his men were on the island watching for smugglers when they saw a lone horseman crossing the river. They opened fire and simultaneously a group on the other side of the river opened fire on the Americans.

At the same time a group of Mexicans surrounded on the island by the Americans began firing. Scotten fell under the first fire with a bullet through his head and another one through his hip.

He was instantly killed. The Americans succeeded in driving off their assailants, shooting a horse from beneath one of the attackers and apparently wounding the rider, who escaped to the Mexican side of the river.
