Rain's Craterian, Sunday. "The Letter" comes to Hunt's Craterian tomorrow, starring Jeanne Eagels.

Leslie Crosbie is human, all too human. In a jealous frenzy she kills her lover. Wholly feminine she waves on the witness stand such a clever misrepresentation of the facts as to gain the passionate sympathy of several hundred Singapore planters, their wives and the legal lights conducting her trial.

Jeanne Eagels plays this subtle, cowardly creature with the passion she put into her famous Sadie Thompson, and at times with a restraint that makes Leslie all the more deadly. Her lines are all spoken, as are those of the stage-trained supporting cast. Herbert Marshall, Reginald Owen, J. P. Heggie and Lady Treen Tsen Mei among them.

At Rialto Sunday. "Protection," the hard-boiled, twisted melodrama of newspapermen and racketeers which comes to the Rialto theater tomorrow, develops a front page story and furnishes a very human romance with the wins of adventure.

Guns, battles and extra edition news pop simultaneously when a fearless editor determines to expose a graft scandal and drive the protected racketeers from town.
