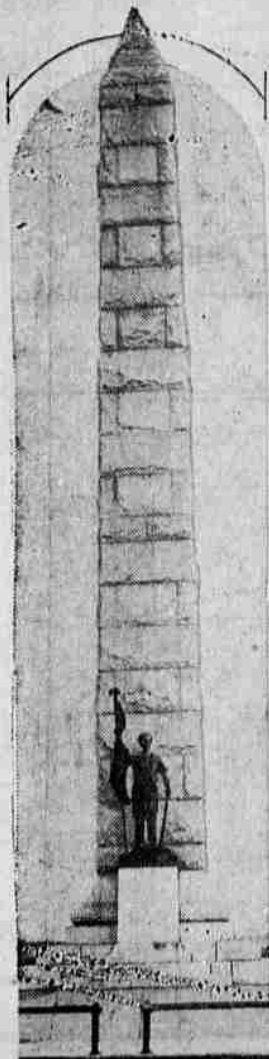


CAMERAGRAMS



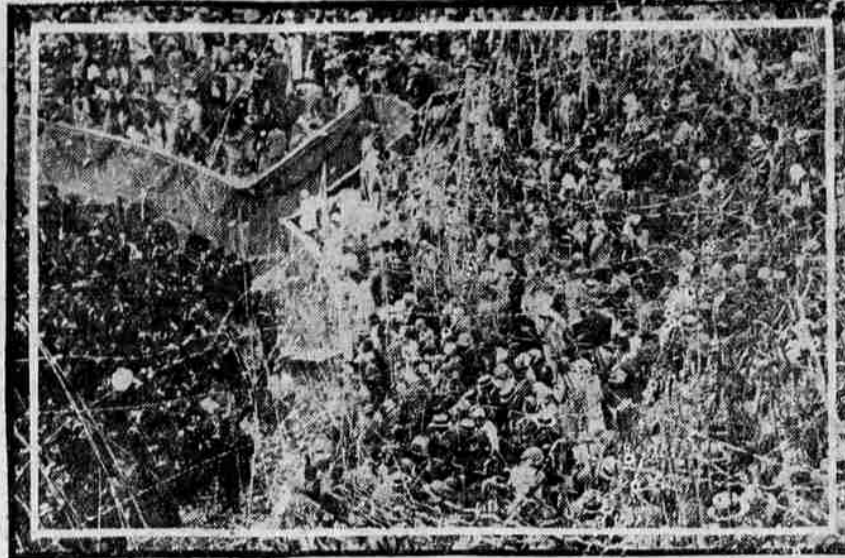

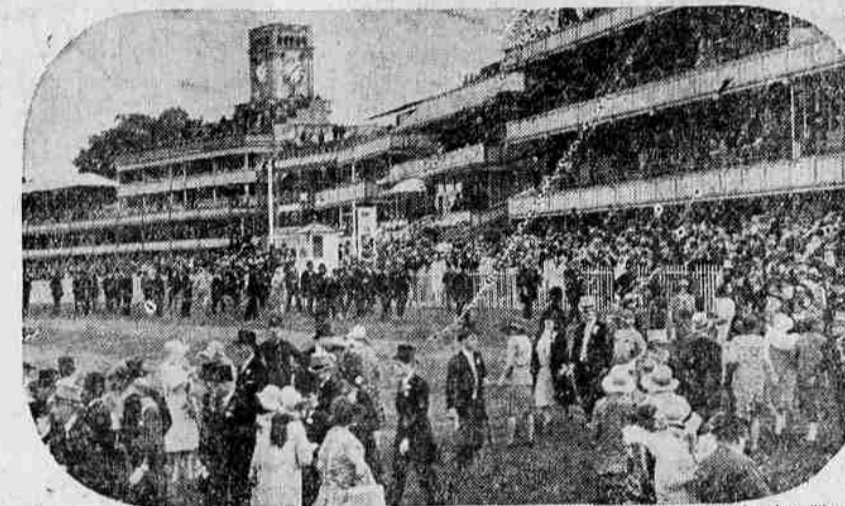

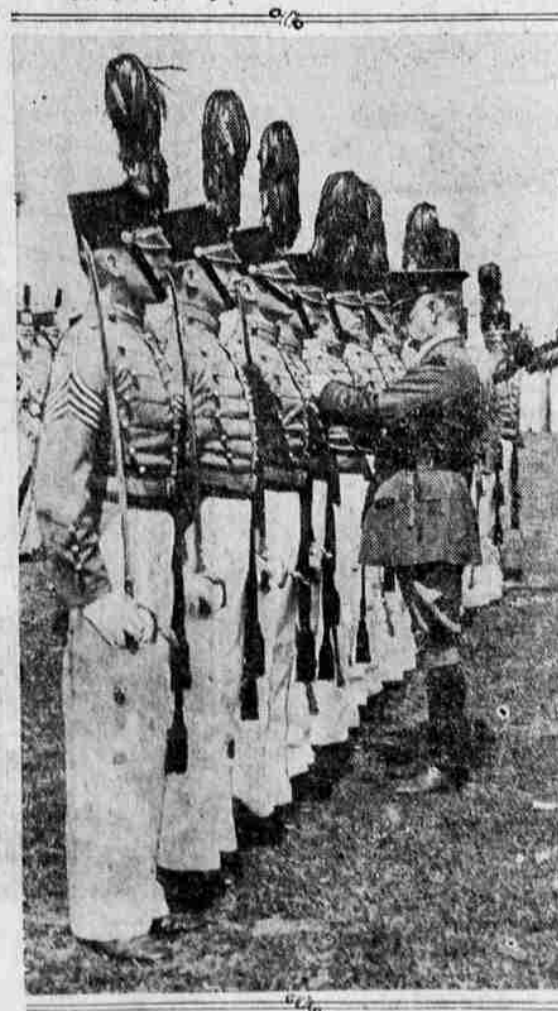

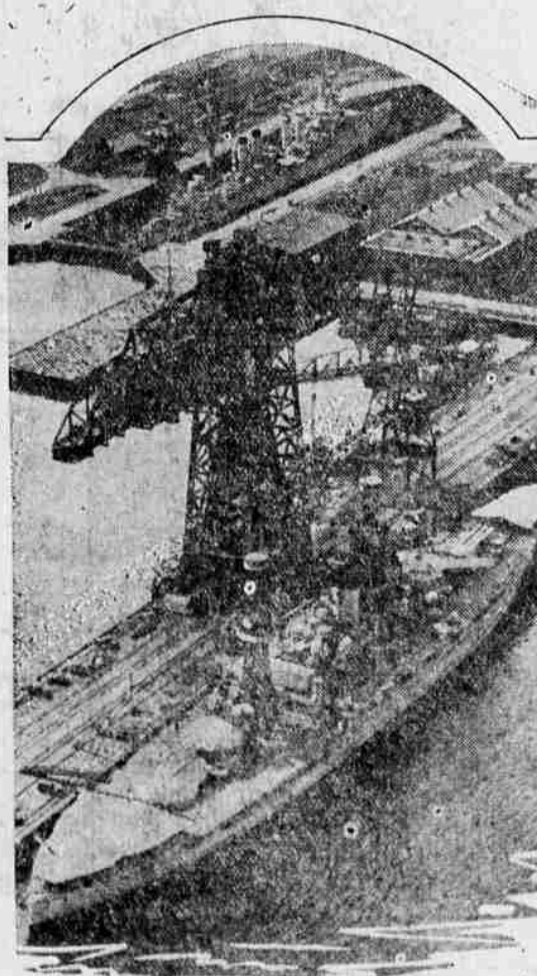

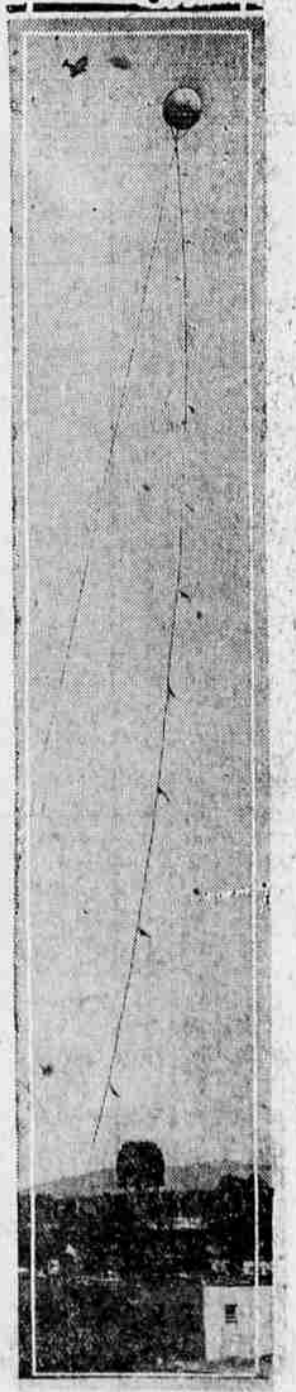
