Registrations have been adjusted according to credits earned at the summer session of school, which closed Friday morning, with all work successfully completed. Report cards of high school students, which were not called for will be given out at the opening of the regular fall term in September at the high school, according to C. G. Smith. Writing certificates may be obtained at the school superintendent's office.

There were 64 students registered in the high school department, with 69 in regular attendance, which was 17 higher than last year. Sixty-seven credits were granted this year, which is lower than former years, due to the fact that students were only allowed to take one new subject, and one in review, or for credit if the student had failed previously. Twelve students took subjects for review only, without receiving any credit for the work.

There were three teachers in the high school division: C. G. Smith, principal; Miss Josephine Kirtley and Mrs. Lucille O'Neil.

In the high school group the following students were registered outside of the Medford district: Stoyl Caster, Ernestine Dahack, Kaynor Guy, Pauline McNeil, Benton Neximan, Margaret Pruet and Paul Turner.

Attendance at summer school was above the average, with 45 absence for 64 pupils, an average of approximately seven-tenths of a day per pupil. All time lost due to absence was made up by the students, unless daily grades averaged 79 or above.
