

### THREE WOMEN IN CALIFORNIA STILL MISSING

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—(AP) Three elderly California women missing in several rugged sections of the state, were still the objects of fruitless searches today.

Authorities and private trackers engaged for over a week in hunting for Miss Edith Irene Wolfkill, missing from her Solano county ranch, were about to give up the search.

Mendocino county officials kept up a hunt for Mrs. E. N. Rowe, 77 who dropped from sight Thursday noon while picking berries near her ranch south of Fort Bragg.

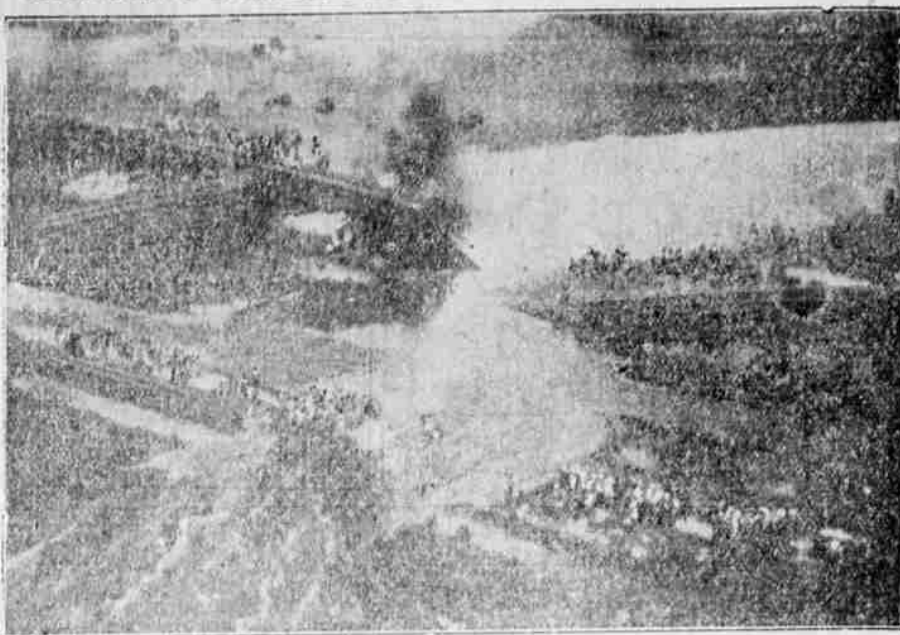
Another search was initiated by Tulare county officials for Mrs. S. E. Knight, 71. She walked away from the home of her son near Visalia and has not been seen since. Sheriff's deputies said the woman was probably wandering in the woods near the dwelling.

A systematic search of the ranch near Fairfield and surrounding country for Miss Wolfkill has failed to reveal a trace of the woman. Miss Betty Ritschard, of Los Angeles, former nurse of the eccentric heiress, told authorities she is convinced Miss Wolfkill hid in a ravine on her own ranch and died from exposure. She would have done this, the former guardian said, to hide from a newly engaged nurse.

Mrs. J. E. Conklin of San Francisco, nurse, was next on duty today. Miss Wolfkill disappeared, gave a kidnapping clue. She said she heard Miss Wolfkill say: "I will not leave. This is my home." Miss Conklin said she heard the words on the ranch house porch and she did not know with whom Miss Wolfkill was talking.

### S. P. OFFICIAL JOINS BIG AERIAL CONCERN

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 22.—(Special)—Edward H. Sharpe, assistant manager of development and colonization of the Southern Pacific Lines, has resigned to assume direction of public relations for the Aviation Corporation. It was learned today, Sharpe, who has been with the Southern Pacific and affiliated company in San Bernardino, Cal., Los Angeles and San Francisco, for 17 years, was its point of contact with newspapers and civic and agricultural associations.

The Aviation Corporation owns a controlling interest in five air transport companies, which operate between 54 principal cities in 19 eastern and middle western states. Mr. Sharpe's headquarters will be in New York.

### EDWIN THOMAS SAFE AFTER LOSING TRAIL

SALEM, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—Search for three missing Salem men was discontinued when the trio wandered into a logging camp in time for dinner after spending the night in the open and living on a diet of fish. The trio, for whom a search had been conducted by air and land, consisted of Edwin A. Thomas and Addison Lane, employees of a Salem newspaper, and Horace Baker, inability to locate a fire trail while fishing along the Abiqua Sunday caused them to lose their way.

### CANNERY DEMAND AIDS GROWERS IN PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, July 22.—(AP)—Produce was plentiful, but prices held firm at the east side market of the Gardeners' and Growers' association today. Raspberries, blackberries and loganberries were standing up like Gibraltar without any sign of recession. Raspberries and loganberries have both passed their peak without weakening, and with the blackberries getting more abundant every day, quotations persist in sticking around the same figures which marked the opening of the season. Failure of the strawberry crop in some localities and shortage in the cherry output are believed to have created a larger cannery demand for other fruits. Cherry prices have held up remarkably well with the demand still active.

Following prices were quoted at the east side market:  
Peas, 4 and 50c; beans, 30c; corn, 40c; white corn, 40c; carrots, 10c; and onions, 25c; turnips, 45c; radishes, 20c; lettuce, \$1 and \$1.25; celery, 80c and \$1; asparagus, \$1.50; squash, 50c; cucumbers, 75c; beans, 10c; royal anns, 50c; pie cherries, 30c; potatoes, 3c and 2 1/2c; tomatoes, \$2.50; strawberries, \$2; raspberries, \$2.25; blackberries, \$2; loganberries, \$1.50; currants, \$2; peaches, \$1.25; apricots, \$1.25.

### EUGENE AIR PARTY HER TUESDAY NOON

EUGENE, Ore., July 22.—(Special)—Medford will be visited by representatives of the Eugene Sunset Trail celebration Tuesday noon. At the time a big monoplane will circle low over the city dropping the special payment edition of the Eugene Register and advertising the air derby to be held during the celebration on July 25, 26 and 27. The party making the trip includes James King, representing the parent organization; Kelly Branstetter, representing the air derby committee; Frank Ray Eddy, editor of the special edition, and George H. Goffroy, director of publicity. Ashland, Roseburg and Grants Pass will be visited during the afternoon.

The airplane trip is sponsored by the Eugene Register, the air derby committee of the American Legion and the Hobb Airways.

### MINERS ARE SEALED IN MALAY TIN MINE

SINGAPORE, Straits Settlement, July 22.—(AP)—Twenty-three Chinese coolies were entombed today in a tin mine at Papan, in Perak, when half the face of the open east mine fell in. Efforts to dig out the entombed men were fruitless, owing to a volume of debris. It was believed a subterranean river runs through the mine which is one of the oldest in the Malay country.

### REHEARSALS NEEDED BY ACTOR HUSBAND

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 22.—(AP)—Marie Antaire, screen actress, had announced she and her husband, Walter Kane, stage actor, have separated. "He is a wonderful chap, but needs a few more rehearsals as a husband," Miss Antaire said. No divorce proceedings were contemplated at present, she said.

**Hero Drowns**  
PASCADERO, Cal., July 22.—(AP)—James Curran, 18, knowing himself to be a poor swimmer, carelessly went to the rescue of his companion, Edwin Allen, who had slipped off a raft in Pascadero creek. Both boys were drowned.

### CURTISS COMPANY PLANE AND SEVEN SEE CITY SUNDAY

Seven representatives of the Curtiss Publishing company, making a survey of aeronautical development, manufacturing and airway service throughout the country, stopped over on the old port during the noon hour yesterday and conferred with local officials.

### DEER AND HORSE HIT ON HIGHWAY

Evidence continues to accumulate that deer this year are appearing not only unusually numerous, but through their comparative tameness are causing accidents to tourists on the roads meeting at night.

The Grants Pass Courier relates that last Friday night a deer on the Redwood highway was struck by tourists and badly injured that it was killed in Grants Pass by Game Warden Merrill to which city it was taken by the tourists.

A horse also figured in a highway accident, according to the same paper, which says: "Serious cuts about the face and hands were suffered by Dr. Charles L. Bennett of Los Angeles and J. L. Pomeroy, health officer of Los Angeles county when a horse reared and fell on their car as they were driving about eight miles north of Wolf Creek recently." The horse was grazing by the highway and when frightened it leaped and plunged both feet through the windshield.
