

DESIRE FOR NEW SPUDS RIOT CAUSE

Dannemora Quiet Today After Desperate Break By Convicts—Sullen Silence Replaces Jeers of Conquered Inmates—New Potatoes and Sunday Holiday Denied.

DANNEMORA, N. Y., July 23.—(AP)—Clinton state prison, known throughout the underworld as "Siberia," today was nearing normal after the failure yesterday of 1300 desperate convicts to battle their way to liberty, and after a night spent under the sullen eyes of scores of guards reinforced by 14 state troops.

The hoos and hisses and raucous laughter flung by the conquered prisoners at the guards last night after they were forced to return to their cells, leaving three of their fellow rioters dead, had ceased. In the place was a sullen silence, or, at most, a guarded grumbling.

Prison, state and county authorities sought to determine the background of the riot which led to the simultaneous storming of three walls by the battalions of desperadoes yesterday morning.

The state department of correction devoted attention to a report that the battle had its motive in the fact that the men had asked for new potatoes instead of old for their meals, and wanted a full holiday in the yards Sunday, requests that had been refused. They have had half of Sunday for baseball games, band concerts and other forms of amusement.

Governor Roosevelt expects to learn the facts at first hand when he inspects the institution next Monday.

Warden Harry M. Kaiser, in a statement, placed responsibility for the outbreak on a group of "ifers" sent to the prison from other state penal institutions for discipline. Clinton was definitely set aside more than a score of years ago as a "punishment prison" for "tough guys."

At the time the convicts swooped down on their guards, there were 113 serving life sentences, 499 serving 20 years or more, and others with shorter terms, bringing the total to 1,588. The trouble, said

the warden, had been in the air for weeks.

Break After Breakfast.

The break came as 1,300 of these men left the huge mess hall where they had breakfasted. Suddenly they began to mill about, like hornets coming out of a disturbed nest. The inside guards tried to beat their way to the ring-leaders, but they were overpowered.

Then all the pent-up passion of the prisoners flamed forth. They fired the carpenter and the wave shops, and smashed the dynamo and left the institution without lights or power.

The prison siren screamed and the whole town grasped weapons and started for the walls. The convicts formed human pyramids like circus acrobats, flinging the topmost man to the edge of liberty on the wall above. The guards' guns spat and the prisoners fell back, three dead.

Seeing at last that the break was a lost cause, some of the men returned to their cells and some barricaded themselves in a storehouse.

The riot lasted more than five hours. Prison authorities saw in the outbreak an enactment of what might have happened several months ago if the "spoaching" of Harry Ross, an inmate, had not revealed a prisoners' arsenal of revolvers, rifles, knives and "snouch dynamite to blow up the whole place." Ross got a pardon for his revelation and brought down on his head the threat of those he had reported to "get him inside or out."

SIREN SETS FIRE TO GET IN PAPER

COLVILLE, Wash., July 23.—(AP)—It's a publicity-mad fire siren that starts its own fires, just to get on front pages.

The mission in life of the Colville fire siren is to sit on top of the creamery building, which also houses the fire department, and hoot dementedly during conflagrations. There has been no occasion for the siren to squawk recently. The fire alarm business was bad. Then W. Aeron, manager of the creamery, chanced to look on top of his building. Flames were rising all around the siren. Water was applied.

Today's investigation disclosed that a spark from a nearby chimney had fallen into a piece of muslin firemen had wrapped around the siren's neck, to keep the dust out of its voice. The muslin fell from the siren to the tar paper roof, and there was the fire.

PRANK OF DRUNK SENDS AUTO OFF ROAD AT REDDING

REDDING, Cal., July 23.—(AP)—One man was killed and four others injured, two seriously, when their automobile overturned last night on a steep grade of Iron Mountain road, 12 miles north of here. The dead man was Charles Foster, 50, of Redding, owner of the car.

John Williams, shift boss of the Iron Mountain mine, and John Johnson, an employe, received possible fractured skulls among other injuries, and may die. The others injured include Edward Debride, driver of the machine, who told physicians Foster asked him to drive the party to the mine, as they had been drinking and "didn't want an accident."

The car was descending the grade, Debride said, when Foster, who was sitting beside him, pushed his foot off the brake pedal and stepped on the accelerator. The car struck a hole and overturned, throwing the passengers clear. Foster died en route to the hospital.

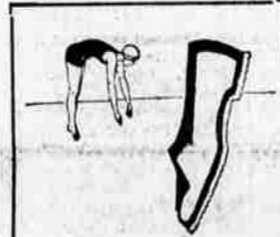
