

PLAN FOR ALBANY ASHLAND STREETS COLLEGE TOLD AT ARE IMPROVED AS MEET OF CLERICS FINANCES PERMIT

ALBANY, Ore., July 25.—(Special.)—The Presbyterian synod of Oregon, which has been in session at Albany college for a week, closed Tuesday with the "Message of the Moderator of General Assembly," Dr. Cleland B. McAfee of Chicago. Dr. McAfee gave a series of daily addresses to the synod, which drew a large attendance of Albany people, besides the members of the synod.

Monday was "Albany College day," with a fine report of the college and its work of the year given by Dr. Thomas W. Hibbs, the new president of the college. The report showed a 27 per cent increase in the student body for last year and fine prospects for further increase for the year beginning in September.

Several requests to the college during the year were reported, including that of \$100,000 by the late E. V. Hauser of Portland, who was a trustee of the college. Plans are being made for the erection of a new gymnasium soon, and it is hoped to begin construction this year of a new dormitory, with other buildings to follow as soon as funds can be secured.

Albany college makes special effort to aid its students who need financial help. In securing an education, to find employment while in college, and last year there were 89 students who earned a part of all of their expenses. Together they earned \$18,000 during the year, 1928 being the highest amount earned for the year by any one.

Among the newly elected trustees of the college is Henry W. Frame of Phoenix, in place of Rev. E. P. Lawrence of Medford, who has been a trustee from Oregon of the Theological seminary at San Anselmo, Cal.

Other striking features of the education report of the synod are the remarkable growth of week-day and vacation church schools. Among the latter, special mention was made of the schools recently held by the Phoenix and Roseburg churches during the public school vacation, and each continuing for four weeks. The week-day church school at Ashland was specially mentioned, with an enrollment of nearly 600 from the first to the sixth grades, inclusive, or about 97.5 per cent of the total enrollment in those grades.

Remarkable growth the past year in mission study class enrollment among the women of the Oregon Presbyterian churches was also noted in the women's report to the synod.

INSTALL BIG COOLER ASHLAND LITHIA FOUNT

ASHLAND, Ore., July 25.—(Special.) A fine new cooling apparatus has been installed in the Lithia fountain in the Plaza. The new machine has four times the capacity of the first one and is installed with the guarantee that it will fill the need. The water will be cooled to 42 degrees, which is considerably cooler than the temperature of the water at the spring.
