

### BIG THREE DAYS BARGAIN EVENT STARTS MONDAY

The three co-operative day bargain event of Medford's merchants opens tomorrow morning and promises to be one of the biggest community merchandising occasions of the year. The merchants have made special arrangements for this event, which will feature hundreds of attractive bargains and the window displays will reflect in a small way what awaits the people of southern Oregon and northern California in the stores.

### NEW BOOK SYSTEM COUNTY OFFICES

The audit of the county school clerk books was completed in the county superintendent's office yesterday. The 75 or more clerks throughout the county are now under hand and ready to assume their new duties. With the establishment of the new system of bookkeeping, some of those new in the school clerk work will be required to spend considerable time studying before they actually begin their tasks.

### APPLEGATE CASE DECISION SOON

The case of Harley Hall vs. Harold Crump, contesting the election of the latter as director of school district No. 87, which took up all of Friday afternoon, will be decided by Judge Harry D. Norton before he leaves on his vacation August 1, according to an announcement made at the close of the trial Friday evening. The election which was the cause of considerable debate in the Applegate district, following the close of the polls on June 17, culminated in the filing of a suit by Harley Hall against the defendant shortly afterward. Mr. Hall charges in his complaint that the first legal ballot of 32 votes cast, was thrown into the stove, and that before the second ballot was taken some of the voters had left the meeting, and others refused to vote.

### New Dollar Bill Disappeared In Twelve Minutes

### CAL WELLS BACK FROM THE EAST VACATION SPOILED

Cal C. Wells, deputy United States marshal, with headquarters in Medford, has lost much weight in worry about his 30 days' vacation, which he planned to take months ago, but some new duty arose each time, which necessitated his delaying the vacation start. Finally, several weeks ago he deemed the coast clear and the time propitious for taking that long earned rest, so he went to Portland, spent a few days and then departed for Seaside to spend the vacation. Everything was going along swimmingly until when he left the ocean air for a day to go to Portland to get a new collar button. Just as he was about to depart for Seaside again, he received orders to take Mrs. Hazel Winslow, who had been arrested at Pinehurst and held in jail for some time in Medford, before being taken to the federal authorities at Portland, back to Pasadena, Me., a town near Baltimore, for trial on the charge of embezzling funds years ago when she was assistant postmaster of Pasadena.

Mr. Wells returned to Medford last week from the trip, during which he spent a day and one-half at Baltimore, a day at Washington and two or three days at Chicago while waiting on official duty, but that trip did not count on his vacation, so he has 18 days of it left. He now walks about with fingers crossed trying to figure out a safe time to start in using up the remainder of the vacation.
