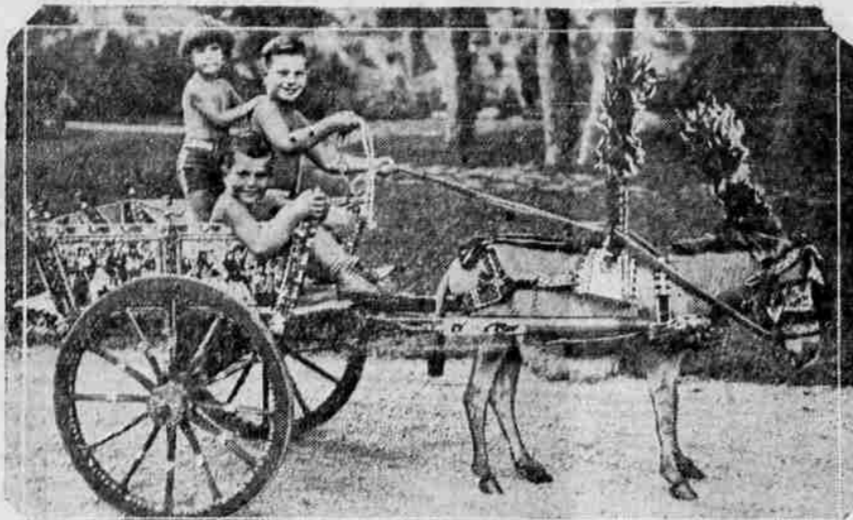




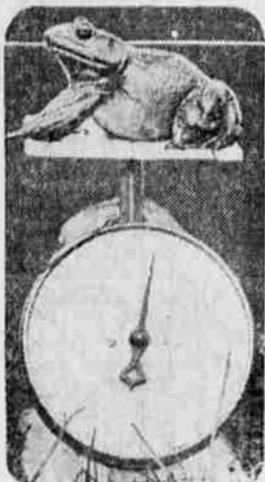

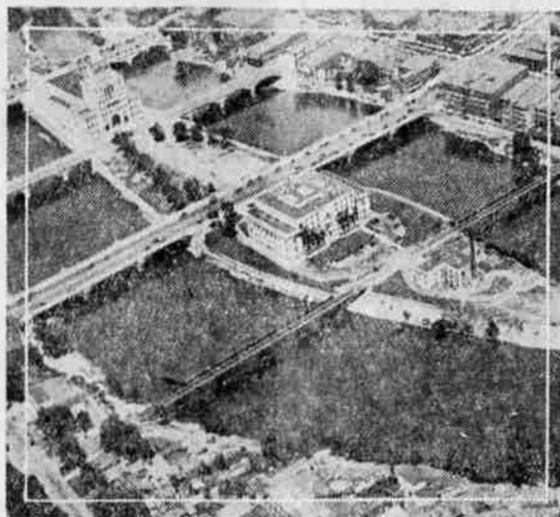

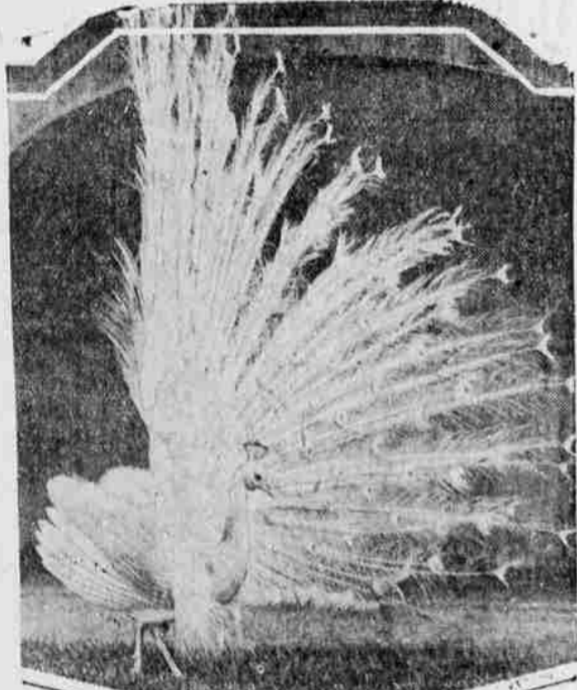

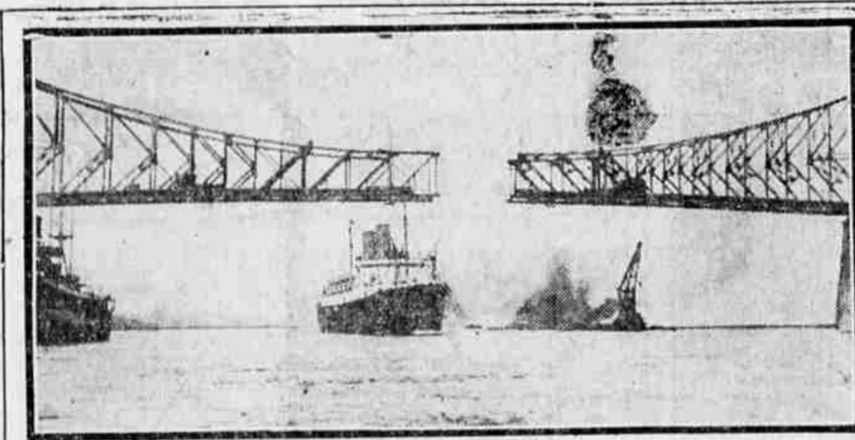

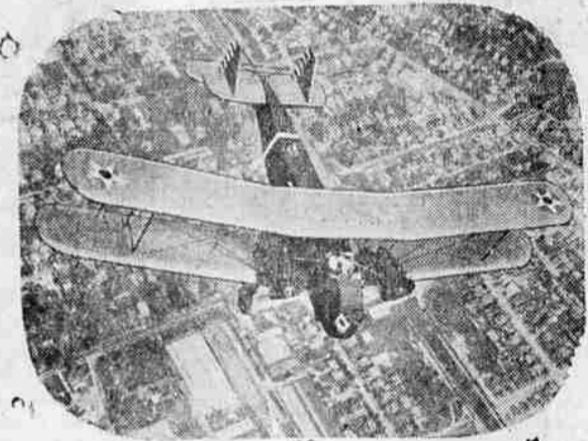
POET LAUREATE Robert Bridges, of England, who has held that post since 1913, recently was bestowed the Order of Merit by King George. A new study of him is pictured here.
