## WOMEN ATHLETES IN ANNUAL MEET SMASH OLD MARKS

CHICAGO, July 27.—(AP)—Five world records were broken today at Soldier Field today as the Illinois Women's Athletic club won the national women's A. A. U. track and field championship with a total of 31 points.

Betty Robinson of the I. W. A. C. America's only winner in the 1928 Olympic games, provided the exceptional performance of the meet, setting new world records in the fifty and one hundred yard dashes.

The often smiling Chicago girl who runs like a man, clipped one-fifth of a second from her own fifty yard dash mark, sprinting the distance in 65.4-5. In the longer dash she broke the accepted mark of 1:12-3 seconds held jointly by herself and Helen Milkey Warren. Her mile mark, in the semi-final heat, by one-fifth of a second and equaled the performance in the final.

Rena MacDonald, a member of the 1928 Olympic team, accounted for two first places for the Boston Swimming association and set one world mark. She won the eight hundred yard dash with a time of 42:00. 43 inches to break the record of 49 feet, 4 1/2 inches set in 1924 by Lillian Copeland of Pasadena, Cal. She also won the dimeus with a throw of 113 feet, 14 inches.

## OHIO CITY USES A TOWER GARAGE IN PARKING CARS

SANDUSKY, Ohio (AP)—Two automobiles parked in a building which makes up a parking area 17 feet 4 inches by 35 feet, the size of the plot occupied by the average two-car garage.

But the height and latitude have nothing to do with this case. In this invention of J. E. Morton, Sandusky engineer, it's the arrangement of the cars on a platform, each of sufficient strength to support an auto that makes the first auto parking tower a success. It is now in use.

With this auto parking tower, Morton and his associates believe they will solve the parking and garage problems caused by the population of Sandusky, which has increased their capital in the town and are preparing to market the idea.

First they have erected a demonstration tower in Sandusky on a location adjacent to the factory of a company that manufactures the chains and other working parts of the tower. It is a reinforced concrete structure.

The engineers say that a tower of greater height will be larger than that shown by the structure here, but can be erected in a height sufficient to house 50 autos. For accommodations above the number two or more towers would be installed in series.

In operation, the tower is much like an automatic elevator. The driver puts his car into the tower on the ground level and when he does so, it rises on a steel platform—no individual parking spaces—suspended from the heavy endless chains. He leaves his car, steps outside the tower, pushes a button or turns a key switch and presto! his car moves upward and out of the way into its own place.

When the tower starts to sink, the ground level is pushed up to the ground. An elevator motor of two-horse power per car suspended from the operating power.
