

HOOVER TO TALK CUT IN MILITARY BUDGET

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—President Hoover, with a party of cabinet officials and army officers left late Friday for his fishing camp on the Rapidan river in the Virginia Blue Ridge mountains to spend the week end.

The president plans to hold a series of conferences with high army officials concerning the proposed survey of the army establishment to be conducted with a view to effecting economies.

HISTORY OF FARMERS' EXCHANGE; A REVIEW OF ITS ACTIVITIES AND MEN WHO DIRECT COURSE

The Farm Bureau Co-operative exchange was organized here in 1912 by a group of farmers, for the purpose of pooling their buying and selling power in an endeavor to so regulate the prices received for their products and the prices paid for their supplies that there would at least be a margin of profit.

It was organized under the stress of dire necessity and from the very start proved to be a great benefit to the farmers of Jackson county.

The institution is one of the oldest business concerns in this city and their warehouse at the corner of Fourth and 7th on the railroad is one of the city's landmarks. As a business concern its policy has been to aid the farmer in his marketing produce and buying supplies eliminating the middleman and broker as far as possible and returning to the farmer all the profit.

The organization has survived many adversities and is now a going concern and a big factor in handling the farm business of Jackson county.

Many of the best known farmers of this community have served on the board of directors, guiding and directing its business affairs.

A complete reorganization was effected last January and the name of the organization changed to Farmers' Exchange Co-operative, at which time the members of the county signified their intention of adopting it as their marketing medium and extending it their whole-hearted support.

The present board of directors, well known farmers in Jackson county, are as follows: J. H. McCracken, president of the board of directors, has been a resident of Valley View district, southeast of Medford, near Ashland for the past 21 years. He is one of the choice farmers of that section. Dairying, general farming, and sheep raising are his specialties and Mrs. McCracken's flock of Leghorn layers complete the general farming scheme.

Mr. McCracken is one of the prominent dairymen of this section. He is president of the Oregon State Dairymen's association. He became identified with Jackson County Fair a few years ago as a member of the executive committee and superintendent of livestock exhibits. He has been active in boys' club work, and with the Boys' 4-H livestock club of Valley View.

As a director of the Farmers' Exchange Co-operative, and also of the Poultry Producers' association, he has given freely of his time and energy to promote organized co-operative marketing. Justin E. Judy, vice-president of the board of directors, has been a resident of the Medford community in the Griffin creek district for the last 27 years, and is well and favorably known here.

As a young man he took advantage of his opportunity to attend Oregon Agricultural college. He has been engaged in general farming, orcharding, dairying and poultry raising. For years he has been a member of the Farm Bureau Co-operative and the Poultry Producers' association and has served as director on each board. He has given freely of his time and energy in a loyal effort to help hold up farmers' co-operative marketing.

Mr. Judy has always been one of our public spirited citizens and in his business point of view always considers the best interests of the farming industry as a whole.

SALEM, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Nineteen persons were killed and 250 injured in traffic accidents in Oregon during the month of June, according to the monthly report of T. A. Rafferty, chief state traffic inspector. The total number of accidents was 254. Failure to obey laws of the road caused 248 accidents and failure to signal 240, while exceeding the speed limit caused 117. Under the general head of carelessness 1123 are listed. Fines for violations totaled \$1899.55 and fees collected \$4186.07. Stolen cars recovered by the department were valued at \$4200.
