ROBIN ROOKIE TURNS IN FIRST MAJOR VICTORY

Right Handers, Ray Moss, Sprays Reds for 10-2 Triumph—Cubs Increase Lead Over Pittsburgh By Beating Phillies.

By Herbert W. Barker, Associated Press Sports Writer. Ray Moss, right-handed pitcher for the Brooklyn Nationals, finally has completed a major league apprenticeship begun in the spring of 1926. Moss, 19, to a triumph over the Cincinnati Reds yesterday marked the first complete victory game he ever has pitched in the majors and, incidentally, it was only the second game he ever started and finished. He gave the Reds only eight scattered safeties while the Robins were mauling Ted Lyons and Duke Ehrhardt for 17, four of them by the illustrious Babe Herman. The Robins pounded Lucas for four runs in the first inning and tallied four more before he went to the showers in the sixth. Chief interest in the National league struggle centered in Chicago, where the Cubs, by trouncing the Phillies, 12 to 10, increased their lead over Pittsburgh to three and a half games. Hack Wilson's 28th homer with Heathcote on base in the eighth was the decisive blow of the game. Previously Heathcote had cracked out his 22nd homer and Heathcote also had hit for the circuit. Don Hurst's 19th and 20th homers of the year kept the Phils in the running. The crippled Pirates lost another game to the Boston Braves, 19 to 5. Trailing by 9-7 at the end of the eighth, the Braves assaulted Henry Meine and Fred Fussell for four runs and the old ball game. L. Warner's homer with one on had given the Pirates a lead in the eighth. Tabbit Maraville showed no signs of old age, cracking out five hits in as many times at bat. The New York Giants crashed out 17 hits off the delivery of various and sundry pitchers to swamp the St. Louis Cardinals, 11 to 2. Given a big lead, Larry Denton coasted in to an easy victory. May Ott hit his 29th homer and Bill Terry his 9th. Action in the American league was confined to the Chicago White Sox' 8 to 6 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics, thereby reducing the White Elephant's lead over the little New York Yankees

FAMOUS ANGLER AND HUNTER TO VISIT MEDFORD

Captain Frank Winch, who is now making a 12,000-mile transcontinental tour of the United States by automobile for the purpose of studying at first hand the conditions which affect our wild life in all parts of the country, will be in Medford, Monday, August 5. CHICAGO, July 30.—(AP)—Pa Canzoneri will lead a special cheering section at ringside when his son Tony tackles Sammy Mandell for the lightweight championship at the Chicago stadium Friday night. The New York butcher and farmer landed in his son's camp at the Garden of Allah yesterday and said Mayor Jimmy Walker of New York and Arthur O'Keefe of New Orleans and other notables will help him cheer Tony. "I have never missed seeing my son fight an important engagement," the elder Canzoneri said. "He looks to be in perfect shape and if Mandell catches his right once or twice he will lose his title." Tony's mother, however, refuses to see him fight. Nor will she listen to the radio account of it.

FIELDS GETS OVATION BY HOME TOWN FANS

CHICAGO, July 30.—(AP)—Jackie Fields, world's welterweight boxing champion, has returned to his home town to be received like a conquering hero. He was greeted by hundreds of admirers yesterday when he arrived from Detroit, scene of his triumph over Joe Dundee. He was hoisted into an open car and perched atop the rear seat, as Lindbergh, rode through the city with a hand, a motorcycle and a police escort. There were more than 100 cars in the welcoming parade. Fields is going to spend a few days with his mother in Los Angeles before returning to the welterweight battlefield. Before departure, however, his admirers plan to hold a banquet in his honor.

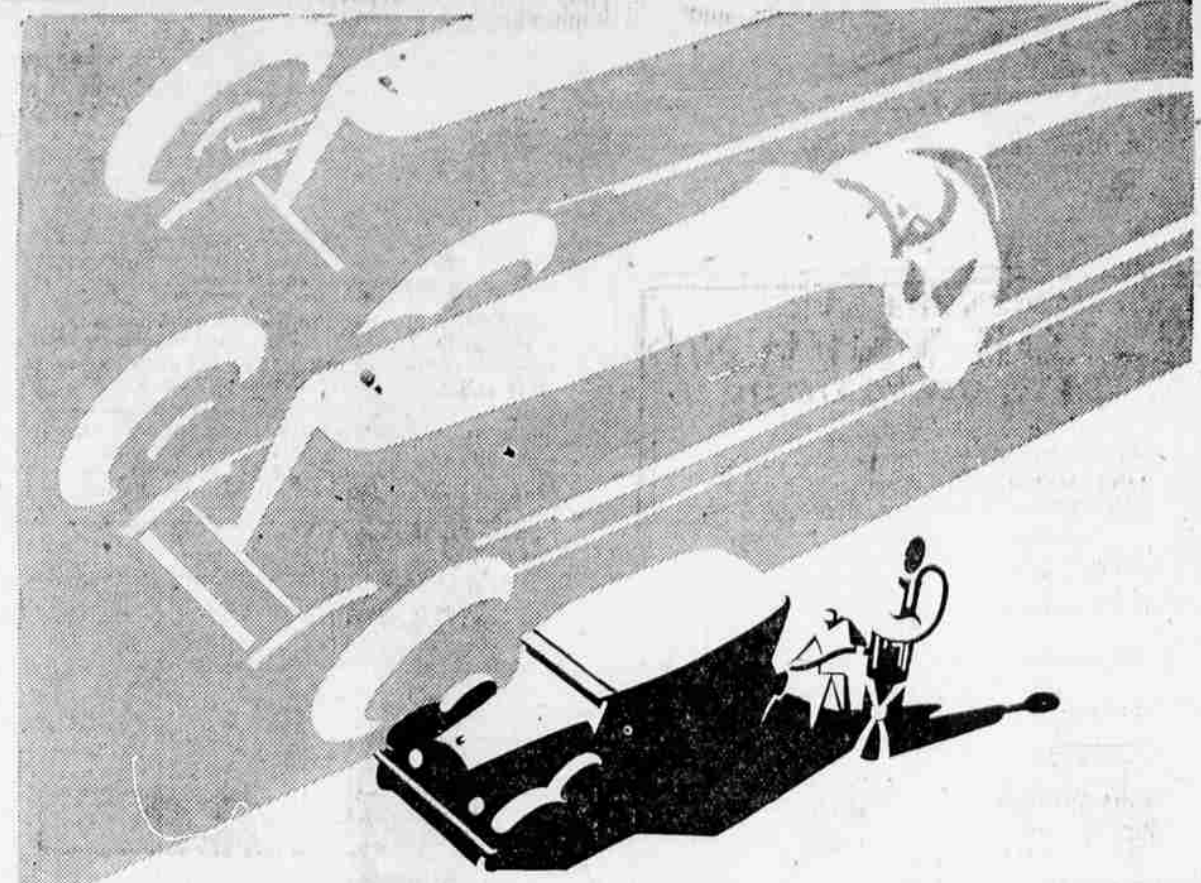
Kid and Steve Fight

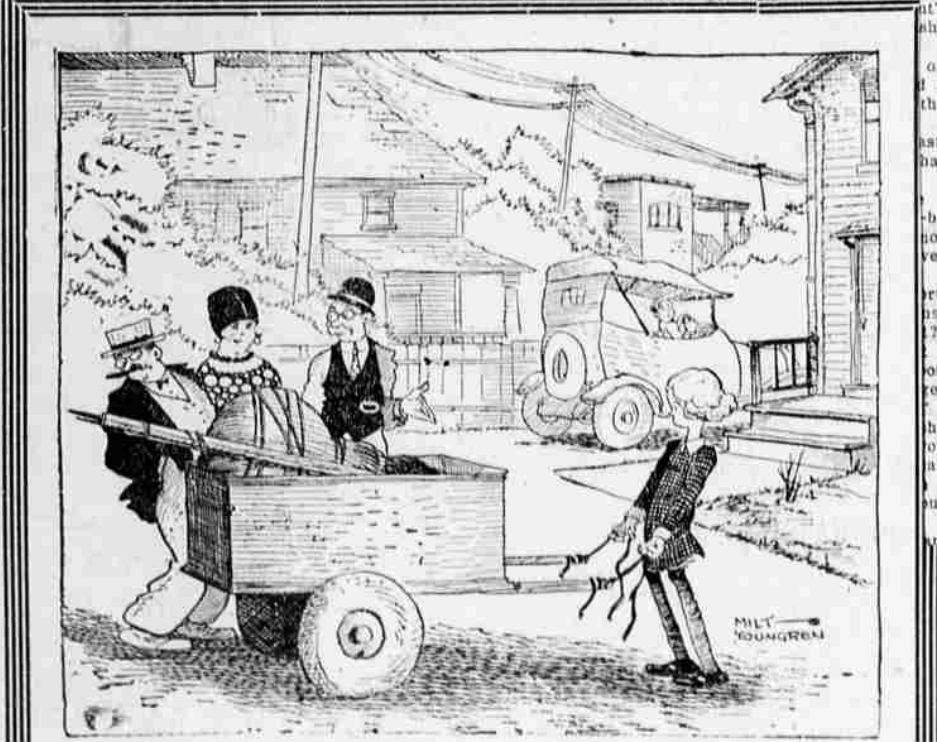
