BANWELL CHOSEN AS SECRETARY OF SEAPORT PROJECT

At a meeting of the directors of the California-Southern Oregon Development association held last night, A. H. Banwell, director of publicity of the Tacoma, Wn., chamber of commerce, was chosen to assume the secretaryship of the association September 1.

At the meeting Josephine county was represented by Messrs. Best, Conklin and Dumeray of Grants Pass, Del Norte county, Calif., by Messrs. Childs, Ireland and Placcek; Klamath county by A. West and Jackson county by C. E. (Pop) Gates and Dr. R. W. Clancy of this city.

Development of the port of Crescent, Calif., and the extension of the Grants Pass railroad to that city, were delegated as the present major objectives of the association.

The expense will be borne pro rata, by the four counties interested and an aggressive campaign will be waged. Secretary Banwell will divide his office time between Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, Crescent City and this city.

ROBT. WASHBURN DEAD, PORTLAND

Robert A. Washburn, for many years a resident of this valley died at Portland this morning age 64 years. He is survived by his wife, Dr. E. H. Hesterman and a son, the late Capt. Tuttle, who died in the Table Rock district.

To scores of Jackson county people, deceased was known as Colonel Washburn.

He was one of the founders of the Lincoln club of this county, serving as its president during several sessions full of humor and politics. In early life he was a newspaperman, and worked on papers in Washington.
