

CLIP WINGS SPAIN'S ACE FOR FIASCO

Major Franco Is Dismissed From Air Service By Premier—Used Italian Plane and French Weather Reports—Government Favored All-Spanish Flight Over Atlantic.

MADRID, July 29.—Major Ramon Franco, Spain's premier aviator and trans-Atlantic air hero, has been dismissed from the Spanish air service for offenses considered derogatory to Spain's air prestige.

The dismissal was not the result so much of undertaking a trans-Atlantic flight recently in defiance of purported government opposition, as in undertaking that flight in an Italian built plane, and in accepting French weather reports rather than those obtained by a Spanish observatory.

Both phases of the aviator's recent attempt to reach New York from Alcazar and from Cartagena, which ended in a forced landing near the Azores, were distasteful to General Pinedo de Rivera, Spanish premier, who had counted on a flight achievement in which every entering element should be Spanish, and none foreign.

The dictator had allowed to be constructed a huge four-motored Dornier Wal plane at Cadiz, of Spanish material, and a Spanish variation of the Dornier design. The plane, named the Numancia, was made available to Major Franco and his three companions, and it was supposed up to the last minute that they intended using it when they took off a month ago.

On the day prior to departure, the plane was given a test flight, and developed some sort of motor trouble. Major Franco on the succeeding morning took off in another Dornier plane, which had been brought to Cartagena from Italy.

On one occasion the Spanish air service reported the weather over the Atlantic favorable for a flight to America, while on the same day a French aviator at Seville, Louis Coustouret, was informed by the meteorological service of his country, collaborating with a station on the Azores, that the weather was not propitious.

Major Franco was made aware of the discrepancy and postponed his flight.

Major Franco was accompanied in the flight which ended at the Azores by Major Eduardo Galarraga, Captain Ruiz de Alda and Sergeant Pedro Madariaga.

MANNIX GETS VERDICT AGAINST THE TELEGRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—(AP) Thomas Mannix, Portland attorney was awarded a verdict of \$25,000 by a jury in circuit court last night in his libel suit against the Portland Telegram. Mannix sued for \$100,000. The jury deliberated six hours. Attorneys for the Telegram said the case would be appealed.

ANNOUNCE POSTAL ROUTE EXTENSION ASHLAND AUG. 1ST

ASHLAND, Ore., July 29.—(Special) An extension of the rural route in the Ashland district has been announced to take effect August 1st, according to a statement given out by Postmaster Fred Wagner. This will greatly improve the established system as well as serve new territory. Portions of California, Emery, W. W. Wightman, Avery and Iowa streets will be affected by the new schedule, and service will be added on Walker avenue, and the new brick and tile factory will be included. Some of the patrons who have had to place boxes some distance from their homes, will now be served at their doors. This change will increase the length of the route to 62.44 miles.

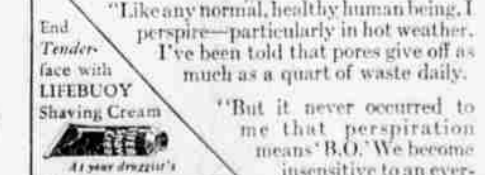
