TRAVEL TO LAKE PROMISES BREAK SEASON RECORDS

If visitors continue flocking to Crater Lake National park the remainder of the season at the rate they have so far this year, all attendance records for previous years will be broken, according to the U. S. department of the interior weekly report.

The total to date this year is 16,129 cars and 51,428 persons, while at this time last year only 15,382 cars and 50,788 persons had visited the lake.

GOODBYE BRIDGE OVER DEEP CANYON IN PARK FINISHED

The completion of Goodbye bridge on Saturday, July 27, marked the end of an era in construction of paved roads in Crater Lake National park. It is the last link in the high standard highway between Medford and the lake on the west, and Klamath Falls and the lake on the south.

Built under the supervision of the United States bureau of public roads, this difficult piece of construction required the work of an average of 10 men per day, over a period of six months. It was erected at the cost of approximately \$19,000.

Made of heavy peeled hemlock, it conforms in design with the Anna Spring bridge, which was completed in 1927. Goodbye bridge, spanning the steep canyon of Goodbye creek, is 240 feet long, 74 feet high and 24 feet wide. It has eight 30 foot spans, double truss. The railing is effective in its simplicity, being made of balusters and rounded posts. The average dimension of the timber is 30 inches in thickness, set on concrete pedestals. The floor of the bridge is at 2 by 6 laminated deck.

The abrupt pitch of Goodbye creek canyon, which is 75 feet deep, added the initial stages of the work dangerous. In the placing of the big timbers on the substructure, it was necessary for the men to be held on the false-work by heavy ropes.

The next large project to be undertaken by the United States bureau of public roads in Crater Lake National park, will be the construction of the proposed rim road. According to John Sargent, engineer in charge, the location surveys on the rim road will be completed later in the season.

Work on the east entrance road to Crater Lake National Park, under the supervision of United States Bureau of Public Roads, consists of two projects. The Sand creek park boundary project, 4.2-10 miles long, is an approach road from The Dalles-California highway to the east entrance of the park. The east entrance, Low creek project consists of 2 miles of road work within the park. The surfacing of this 2-6 miles of road, outside and inside the park, was completed this week.

According to John Sargent, engineer in charge, the 1.3-10 miles of grading which extends from the end of the surfacing project to the Low creek ranger station, will be finished this season. This road serves as a connecting link between the main roads through Crater Lake National Park and The Dalles-California highway to Bend, Oregon.

A surfaced parking place has been provided at the Pinnacles for the motorists who wish to stop and view this phenomenon of nature, which is one of the most interesting features of the east entrance road.
