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DOCKET CLEARED JUDGE PROCEEDS UPON VACATION

Working up until five o'clock last night to clear the local docket of all the pending court business before his departure on a summer vacation, Judge Harry D. Norton and Mrs. Norton left Grants Pass this morning for a month's trip thru Alaska. They plan on taking the inland route along the shore to Dawson, and will visit several of the towns in the interior of Alaska returning to Medford for the opening of circuit court September 2.

Since taking office January 7, the judge has tried over 50 jury cases in addition to an innumerable number of equity cases in both counties, succeeding in entirely clearing the docket of all pending litigation.

The Hughes vs. the Jackson County Creamery case was tried through yesterday morning until 12:26, when it was turned over to the jury. At 1:20 in the afternoon three default divorce cases were heard and decrees granted. The court then adjourned until 10 o'clock for the trial of the case of E. S. Souza's motion for suit and support money in the Tarrance case. After this case, came the arguments of counsel in the Hall vs. Crump contested election case, and court received the jury's verdict in the Hughes case.

After this the judge impounded a jury in the case of the State vs. Kincaid, three half cases, at which time he made known his rulings supporting the contentions of District Attorney George Coddling, and directing the jury to return a verdict of guilty against Luke Kincaid, owner of the dance hall at Gold Hill and Pacific Point.

The judge passed sentence on Kincaid, fining him \$10, as this was a first offense, challenging the constitutionality of the dance hall laws passed by the last legislature. Following this Don Newbury, representing Kincaid, presented a motion to sustain the county of Douglas from interfering with Kincaid's defense after 12 o'clock, pending the time the case is to be determined by the superior court.

The circuit judge denied the motion on the grounds that he did not believe the injunctive powers of the court should be used to keep Kincaid open after midnight in violation of the law.

The court signed several separate orders, and handed down judgment in favor of the plaintiff in the Hall vs. Crump, Appellate division case.

Six o'clock found the judge signing the judgment in the case of Douglas vs. the Jackson County Creamery in accordance with the jury's verdict of \$225 damages to the plaintiff.

At nine o'clock a doubleheader trial began carrying eight passengers, stopped over on the way north.

DR. KRESSE CALLING BY AID OF CRUTCHES

Holding true to the old saying that "You can't keep a good man down," Dr. A. F. M. Kresse, who last Sunday broke his ankle while swimming in the Applegate district, not only received patients at his office today, but made all his calls on his crutches throughout the morning.

Having just left the Sacred Heart hospital last night, the physician was driven around by Mrs. Kresse today and bravely hobbled up the steps to the homes of his patients, made his calls and administered medical treatment. He will have to use crutches for the next eight weeks, according to Dr. J. C. Hayes who attended him.
