When the organization applied for a license to operate in Oregon several chambers of commerce and other associations including the traffic department of the Portland Bureau filed protests based on the following reasons: First, that promotional automobile clubs have an exceedingly bad history; and second, that this specific club has been guilty of many questionable practices.

LOCAL WOMEN IN CAR CRASH NEAR CAPITOL MONDAY

A badly wrenched neck and a few body bruises are being suffered by Mrs. Hamilton Watkins, 218 West Clark street, and lacerations across the face and side of the head, by Mrs. John Underhill of Central Point as the result of a car accident which occurred Monday near Salem.

The two local women were returning with Mrs. H. E. Chapman and Mrs. C. G. Hunt, in the latter's Star sedan, from a camp meeting at Woodburn, Oregon when, attempting to pass a line of three flax trucks, the car skidded on the gravel, struck the side embankment and turned over. The impact thrust Mrs. Watkins headlong against the side of the car, temporarily paralyzing the cords of her neck.

Mrs. Underhill was badly cut on one side of the face and head, necessitating the taking of several stitches in a Salem hospital. The four small children, two belonging to Mrs. Underhill and two to Mrs. Chapman were uninjured, as were the other two women in the front seat. The car was damaged to the extent of \$250 and was repaired in Salem before the women completed their journey home. They arrived in Medford at nine o'clock last night, the two injured women receiving additional medical treatment upon their arrival.
