

GUY BUSH WINS PITCHERS DUEL IN 9TH VICTORY

Cubs Blank Braves 1 to 0 to Retain Five-Game Lead — Pirate Slump Is Broken By Jess Petty in Defeat of Phillies.

Baseball fans who insist pitching is a lost art and that the lively ball has destroyed the defensive features of the game might do well to consider the battle between the Cubs and Boston Braves at Chicago yesterday.

Nine innings of brilliant pitching by Guy Bush on the one hand and Tony Canzoneri and Ed Leever on the other saw the Cubs clinch out a 1-0 decision that enabled them to retain their five-game lead in the National league pennant race.

Bush allowed only five hits in turning in his ninth straight victory and his 15th of the season, against one defeat. Canzoneri gave up but three safeties in the seven innings he worked and Leever held the Cubs hitless the rest of the way.

As it turned out, the Cubs were on one hit. In the first inning, English doubled and Cantwell, looking confused, walked three men in a row to force in the only run of the game.

Jess Petty pitched his first full game of the year at Forbes field and the Pittsburgh Pirates came out of a bad slump to down the Phillies, 3 to 1. Petty allowed only six hits and never was in danger after Combsky tripped with the bases filled in the third inning to give the Pirates a lead.

Larry Benton pitched the New York Giants to another triumph over Cincinnati, 6-1. Dolf Luque was the victim of bunched hits in the third inning when the Giants tallied four times.

The St. Louis Cardinals got to Johnny Morrison for four runs in the first inning and old Pete Alexander was able to coast in to a 2-2 decision over the Brooklyn Robins.

In the American league, the Philadelphia Athletics increased their lead to 10½ games by turning back Detroit, 7-4, while the New York Yankees were losing to Chicago, 3-2. Babe Ruth got his 23rd homer.

Cleveland downed the Boston Red Sox, 19-2, behind the effective pitching by Jimmy Zim.

Held to one run for six innings, the Washington Senators slugged Collins and other St. Louis Browns' pitchers for five runs in the seventh and seven more in the eighth to win, 13-9.

CLEVER BOXER; RUGGED YOUTH MEET TONIGHT

Mandell Overwhelming Favorite in 10-Round Lightweight Go at Chicago—Record Crowd Expected to Fill Stadium.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Tony Canzoneri, chesty little boxer, black from New Orleans, whose stinging fists achieved glory in the bantam and featherweight sectors, tonight aims his weapons at Sammy Mandell, one of the most elusive targets of the ring, in an audacious bid for his world's lightweight crown.

The two will battle 10 rounds to a decision for the title in Paddy Harmon's gigantic punch bowl, the Chicago stadium. A record indoor crowd of 25,000 is expected to watch the duel.

It is to be a skirmish between a clever boxer and a rugged, two-fisted puncher, and Mandell, the boxer, is an overwhelming favorite. The champion expects to win handily by a decision; the challenger is confident of victory by a knockout.

So early did the Rockefeller clock turn back the title bid of Jimmy McLarnin, a pile driving hitter of the Canzoneri type, in his last championship battle, that few observers grant Tony much more than a chance. Although the champion has spent the past year in comparative idleness because of injuries, he has displayed impressive form during his workouts and his great left is apparently as busy as ever.

Weight, too, was a disadvantage Canzoneri had to fight against. He expects to enter the ring four to six pounds lighter than Sammy, and among lightweights such a difference is a considerable handicap.

Today's advantage lay in his punch, his greater ring activity and his age. He is 22 and Mandell is 25.

Both fighters were confident over the outcome and neither one seemed worried.

Ray Miller, Chicago left hook artist, will meet Louis Vicentini of Chile in the 10-round semi-windup and Harmon hopes to match the victor of the Mandell-Canzoneri fight for the title.

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—(AP) Sammy Mandell is expected to receive \$35,000 for defending his lightweight crown against Tony Canzoneri tonight. Both are signed on a percentage basis, Sammy to get 10 per cent and Tony 20 per cent.

"Pa" Mandell and "Pa" Canzoneri will cheer their fighting sons. The elder Mandell will be assisted by a delegation of 1500 fans from Rockford, Ill. Sammy's home town, while Tony's father will receive the help of old friends from New Orleans and New York.

Regardless of the outcome, the lightweight champion tomorrow will be of Italian parentage, Tony and Sammy are both of Italian blood.

Tonight will be the first time Mandell ever fought an important title-bearing fight without delays or troubles. He won the title from Rocky Kansas in 1926 in a driving rain storm and was handicapped by a fractured skull in his battle against Jimmy McLarnin who postponed three times.

LONDON'S SWAINS TO LOSE SUNDAY HAVEN ON RIVER

LONDON (AP)—Sunday on the Thames for years the stand-by of London swains who have hesitantly punted their ladies fair up and down the calm waters and parked them at the bank under conveniently overhanging trees, is threatened with extinction as a recreational institution.

A proposal to drain the river, dig an auxiliary channel, and cut away "scurious" islands, shoulders, and corners of land at a cost of \$1,500,000 has been approved by the works committee of the Thames Conservators.

"If the proposal is carried out," said Basil Holmes, representing the Board of Trade, "the river as we know it will no longer exist. For the surface of the river will be between high banks. Instead of seeing the countryside over the banks those on the river will be below them."

Representatives of various towns along the upper reaches of the river and the Barge Owners' association supported Holmes in his opposition, arguing that the dredging and enlargement of the river would be detrimental to industry as well as pleasure.
