SLEEP, IF ANY, IN SAMPLE ROOM IS LOT OF VETERANS

That upstanding bunch of local American Legion veterans to the state convention at Salem next week, including the drum corps membership and the official delegates from the post, will be upstanding most of the time during that gathering, according to present indications as Lee Garlock, the post adjutant, closed negotiations this forenoon by long distance phone for the sleeping and general headquarters of the delegation to be in the sample room of the Hotel Marion. It is understood here that all the samples will be removed, chiefly to give the boys' snores more room to circulate above and under the cots on which their forms will be theoretically stretched occasionally if the vets are not busy elsewhere; and that a small mirror, a combination hair and toothbrush, a comb and pitcher of water will be hung on one wall in case any of the veterans might want to use them. For reason not understood here generally, as yet, this sample room will also be sound proof, but presumably so that if at any time of the day or night the drum corps contingent should be seized with an urge to practice, the music would not disturb the rest of the sleeping veterans and the ear-earrings beyond the four surrounding blocks. It is understood further that the veterans of the local delegation must leave their boots outside in the alley alongside of the samples, on entering the snorey, but far away from them, as some of the samples might leak. One of the local delegation who will house up with this contingent, although he is not a veteran, is G. O. Alexander, former burgmaster of Medford, who always attends the state conventions of the American Legion with the local delegation. A reservation was made for him by Adjutant Garlock today. He will occupy the hook in the northwest corner of the sample room. Other local visitors will decorate some of the other hooks. At first when the local veterans learned today that they had been assigned to the hotel sample room by the Salem committee on housing and detouring, there was much general indignation until it was learned that the sample room was the former hotel bar. This was entirely satisfactory, as the boys had feared that some other city delegation had been assigned to the sample room. The drum corps and delegates will leave next Wednesday for the Salem convention, by train and auto, as will also many other local veterans.
