

EXPECT 3000 AT JACKSON COUNTY PICNIC SEPT. 2ND

More than 3000 people are expected to participate in the Jackson county picnic, sponsored by the chamber of commerce for September 2. The largest affair of this kind ever planned in the county, the event will be held at the Elks' picnic grounds, with Jackson county residents from both the cities and country as guests.

Caravans will be sent from the local chamber of commerce headquarters, in all four directions throughout the valley within the near future, advertising the affair. The service clubs of Medford will be asked to take charge of these, according to a decision reached at a meeting of the civic affairs committee, which met at the Hotel Medford this noon, under the direction of O. O. Alenderfer, chairman.

That the Pomona Grange, called upon by a special committee, accepted with enthusiasm the invitation to participate in the picnic, and have pledged their co-operation in making it a huge success, was a statement made in a report by C. A. Swigart, president of the chamber of commerce.

CHAMBER COMMERCE ROAD COMMITTEE ACTIVELY AT WORK

ATTORNEY TURNS PISTOL ON SELF AFTER ACCIDENT

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., Aug. 2.—(P)—John Burnette, 27, prominent Elizabethton attorney, accidentally shot and seriously wounded his 17-year-old ward, Virginia Amaral, last midnight, and after calling a physician killed himself.

Mrs. Burnette, a bride of three months, told officers her husband was teaching her how to load a pistol and the weapon discharged, wounding Miss Amaral.

Burnette ran for a doctor. While the doctor was en route, Miss Amaral, Burnette picked up the pistol, walked to the front porch and shot himself.

He then returned to his bride and ward, told them "goodbye" and slumped across a bed.

At the hospital physicians said Miss Amaral's condition was very critical.
