

# RAILROAD TEST WALES GREETS OF EQUIPMENT YANKEE YOUTHS SISKIYOU HILLS IN SCOUT CAMP

New Safety Equipment Tried Out By American Railway Association—Eugene Will Be Headquarters for Research Party.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 2.—(AP)—A series of tests to determine the practicability of newly devised safety equipment was started today when a locomotive and a train of fifty tank cars and cabooses, all especially equipped, were given trials on a level stretch of track near Walker, 18 miles south of here.

Prof. Harry Reuben Koenig of Purdue university, and a corps of research assistants are directing the experiment, for which the American Railway association, representing all the railroads of the United States, has appropriated one million dollars.

The tests are expected to cover a period of 16 months and will subject to every possible operating condition new types of equipment developed in the past four years.

Two hundred cars will be used in the tests which will be made with trains of 20, 100 and 150 cars at a time. The first tests will be made with empty cars and the later ones with tank cars filled with water.

Accurate data on the performance of air-braking equipment such as is now used, is desired. Later the cars will be fitted with equipment devised to replace the present types, and rigid tests will be made under similar operating conditions.

Eugene has been selected as headquarters for the operation tests, the Shasta route tracks of the Southern Pacific between Eugene and Dunsuir, Calif., having been selected as offering the best facilities in the country for testing equipment under all conditions of level track, grades and curves.

## SCAN CUSTING OF PORTLAND PASTOR

PORTLAND, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The legality of the proceedings in which Dr. John Marvin Dean was barred from the pulpit of Hinson Memorial Baptist church here by the board of deacons, will be questioned at a meeting of the congregation here Wednesday. The pulpit of the church was closed to Dr. Dean by the deacons who charged him with conduct unbecoming a minister.

Many members of the congregation question the action of the deacons in evicting Dr. Dean and at the Wednesday meeting the deacons will be asked to repudiate their act.

## FAST GERMAN LINER COMPLETES VOYAGE

BERMEHAVEN, Germany, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The North German Lloyd liner Bremen came home to Bremerhaven today after its maiden round trip voyage to New York, on both legs of which it established new trans-Atlantic crossing records.

It docked here at 7:30 a. m., completing the voyage from New York in a bit more than six days. Its crossing record from New York to Plymouth, England, was four days, 17 hours and 22 minutes.

Prince Tours Tent City to Fraternize With 50,000 Boys — Americans Look Dry, Despite Rain—Kids Carry Cameras.

AIRBORNE PARK, England, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales, representing King George at the great world Boy Scout jamboree, today shook hands with American boyhood and fraternized with the youth of all nations in a tour of this great tent city of 50,000 youngsters.

The prince's call on the American camp came at the end of a tour which began shortly after breakfast.

The American boys all looked dry in spite of a long and ineffectual wait in the rain for the prince last night and all but a very few of the 1200 boys were waiting for him this time with cameras. The neatly-uniformed Americans, lined up to receive the prince, looked like a regiment of three-eyed soldiers—two eyes in their heads and one in their cameras. Many even had small movie cameras.

The Americans had the time of their lives when the prince visited their camp and put up a great show for him. The prince told Brandon McInerney, 15-year-old Rochester boy who is regarded by his companions as a golfing genius, that he had heard of him from Walter Hagen who had prophesied a great golfing career for him.

"You have a long way to go before you beat Hagen, but always remember this, keep your eye on the ball and keep your head still," said the heir to the British throne as he shook hands with the youth.

## DOCTOR BETTERS ARCHERY RECORD

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Aug. 1.—(AP)—An archery record that was believed to have stood for more than three quarters of a century was broken in the National Archery association's tournament here. Dr. E. K. Roberts of Ventura, Cal., won the York round of the competition with a score of 1398 which was 149 points better than the mark set in England 79 years ago by Horace Ford.

The women's national championship was won by Mrs. Audrey Grubbs of the Santa Monica, Cal., Archery club. Her score was 1832 points for the four rounds of the competition. Mrs. Helene Raymond was second with 1755 points. Mrs. Beatrice Hodgson, last year's champion, finished third.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 2.—(AP)—"Big Arthur" Callen, 38, escaped gangster's bullets several times through the use of an armored automobile, was shot to death early today by a lone gunman at Parkside and Memorial avenues.

Six "dum dum" bullets were found in Callen's body. He was shot by a man who pursued him along Memorial avenue. After the shooting the killer walked to a parked automobile a short distance away and was whisked away by an accomplice.

Callen was identified by fingerprint experts from the detective bureau.

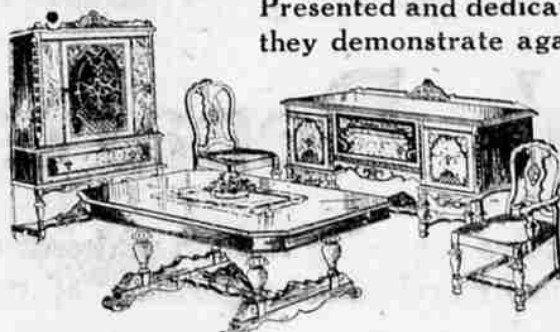
tilles in prime orchards have been reported from some sections of Oregon. This insect, sometimes mistaken for a leaf rust, is difficult to control after it multiplies and gathers in groups protected by a web covering. An application of summer oil, one part to 100, is recommended by the experiment station, which says strong pressure must be used to protect the projecting web. There is some

danger of damaging the bloom of the fruit with oil, hence a grower must decide whether it or the reduced size caused by the spider mite damage will bring the greater loss. In making oatmeal muffins the milk is heated, then poured over the oatmeal which is added to the rest of the mixture. This method gives a finer texture to the product.
