

AGREE ON CONDITIONS FOR PEACE IN LONDON ARE NAMED

Dawes, MacDonald Reach Tentative Basis Is Claim Evening Standard—Story Doubled by 'Inner Circle'—Four Proposals Reported Show Drastic Restriction.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(AP) The Evening Standard says today it is able to announce that Prime Minister MacDonald and Ambassador Dawes have reached a tentative agreement of formula with regard to naval disarmament.

Authoritative quarters in London were inclined to minimize the importance of the Evening Standard's story. It was said no decisions had been reached as yet between London and Washington although the conversations were proceeding satisfactorily.

The Standard said that the following proposals were included in the reported agreement or formula:

- (1)—The battleship program to be restricted.
- (2)—The size of future battleships to be decreased.
- (3)—The life of battleships now in commission to be prolonged, and (4)—A declaration by both countries of their willingness to cease building submarines.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP) The four points on which reports from London said Prime Minister MacDonald and Ambassador Dawes had reached an agreement in their naval discussions were said today by authoritative sources to have no relation to the facts.

State department officials declined to comment on the London report. Every effort has been made by officials here to have all announcements on the London discussions to come from either the prime minister or Mr. Dawes. While it is expected that any announcement of an agreement on the naval question, whether tentative or not, will be made in London, it was strongly indicated here today that considerable ground must be covered before anything in the way of a definite and conclusive agreement between the two powers would be forthcoming.

Soviet Union Announces Drastic Basis for Settlement Manchurian Problem—Liberation Workers, Appointment of Railroad Manager and Conference Demanded.

MOSCOW, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The soviet union government, taking its first public notice of quasi-official efforts to reach a peaceable settlement of the Chinese-Eastern railway controversy with China, today announced three drastic conditions as a solution of the problem raised by Chinese seizure of the railroad.

The conditions were made public in a foreign office statement, which listed in detail conversations between B. N. Melnikov, former consul general at Harbin, and Tsai Yun-Sheng, Manchurian commissioner for foreign affairs.

The negotiations apparently began July 22, and continued until July 29, when Chang Hsueh Liang, governor of Manchuria, remained silent on a proposal that the soviet government name both manager and assistant manager for the railroad.
