

DRYEST JULY IN 18 YEARS; HEAT STAYS BELOW 100

The mean temperature for the month was 71.0 degrees which was 1.4 degrees higher than for July of last year, says W. J. Hutchinson, meteorologist of the Medford station of the U. S. weather service in his monthly meteorological notes for July. He then continues as follows:

"Although the average temperature was higher than for July, 1928, there was no maximum temperature of 100 degrees or above. The highest temperature was 98 degrees on the 24th and 25th which is 8 degrees below the maximum temperature for July, 1928. The past month is the first July since 1920 in which the highest temperature failed to reach 100 degrees. The lowest temperature was 42 degrees on the 25th and was a little below the average minimum."

The mean pressure (sea level) for the month was 29.96 and was slightly higher than for the same period last year. The highest sea level pressure was 30.22 inches on the 15th and the lowest was 29.69 on the 20th.

The month was notable for the absence of moisture, the total precipitation being zero. There has been but one July on record since 1911 until this year when there was no precipitation recorded. The previous July without precipitation was in 1922.

During the month there was 27 clear, 2 partly cloudy and 2 cloudy days. Northwest winds prevailed with an average velocity of 4.5 miles per hour. The maximum wind velocity for the month was 18 miles per hour on the 15th. The total wind movement was 2669 miles. A thunderstorm was noted in the mountains west of the city on the 30th.

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NEW YORK PAPER TELLS LIFE WORK OF JESS WINBURN

Jesse Winburn, president of Jesse Winburn & Co., 475 Fifth Avenue, New York City, bankers, and former advertising man, died here at 1:20 a. m. Sunday in New Rochelle hospital. He was born in Syracuse 61 years ago.

The banking firm was organized in 1922. Mr. Winburn sold his advertising to Barron G. Collier in 1920, and undertook an extensive search of Europe for Raveston's masterpiece, "Portrait of a Gentleman," in which Mr. Winburn saw a striking resemblance to his father. He saw the portrait first 49 years ago, as it was being reproduced on calendars in a lithographing shop in West Broadway, where he was working as a slip-boy.

He resolved to own the original and his actual quest for the old master began in 1893, when he made the first of a series of unsuccessful trips abroad. He followed sales, delved into catalogues, employed agencies, but without success. He went to Europe again in the summer of 1922, and through the aid of Prince Olinsky, former aide to the czar, he located the painting in the home of a Parisian woman. He had it authenticated by French and English art critics and bought it for \$50,000. He offered it to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City, and it was accepted in November, 1923.

Mr. Winburn also had a considerable interest in sports, and in 1924 lent \$20,000,000 francs to the French Olympic fund to make possible the staging of the Olympic games in Paris that year. He was a golf enthusiast, and feeling that women on a golf course spoil a man's game he bought the old Hunt estate in Mount Vernon in 1924 for about \$850,000, then occupied by the Mount Vernon Golf club under a lease running to May 1, 1925.

It was Mr. Winburn's intention to lengthen the course, improve it and turn it into the ideal "links" without a powder puff. He formed the Ironville Golf association with 50 other wealthy men to back the project. However, before they could occupy the course the Westchester County Park commission, with the ratification of the county Board of Supervisors, acquired about 55 acres of the Hunt estate for the purposes of a park and a country boulevard. Mr. Winburn formed a real estate subdivision from the remaining property.

Two years ago Mr. Winburn planned to construct a reproduction at Milton Point, Nye, of Wayside Inn, at South Sudbury, Mass., about which Longfellow's "Tales of a Wayside Inn" were written. It was to have cost \$250,000 but the project never went through. He built a house on the property.

Mr. Winburn was a member of the National Democratic club, the Progress club, Oak Ridge Country club, of Tuckahoe, the Bay Yacht club, of New Rochelle, St. Cloud Country club, St. Cloud, France; the Association of Grand Jurors of New York county, the Columbia Riding club, the American Club Terrace, of Paris. In 1926 he was elected chairman of the Parks Protective and Improvement committee, organized by the Park commission.

Four brothers and two sisters survived. They are Michael Winburn, Henry Winburn, Abraham Winburn and Maximilian Winburn, of Los Angeles; Mrs. Charles Shelley of Brookline, Mass., and Mrs. Ida Schmitzer of New York. Funeral services will be held at his home in Nye at 10:30 a. m. today. Burial will be in Mount Hope cemetery.

SHANGLE HONORED BY PHOTOGRAPHERS

J. Verne Shangle, local photographer, received word yesterday from San Francisco that he was chosen one of the main committees of the Pacific International Photographers' association annual convention, to be held in San Francisco, August 28-31.

This is a signal honor, in as much as he is not only the only one chosen from a small town, but is probably the youngest member serving on any committee for the convention.

Heading the program committee, upon which Mr. Shangle is to act, is Ida M. Reed, well known owner and manager of Camera Craft, monthly photographers publication, which is read throughout the United States and Canada.

There will be over 200 representatives present at the convention from the various cities along the Pacific coast, including those in the states of Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Montana, Arizona and New Mexico. Over 2000 outstanding works of photographic art will be exhibited during the convention.

MUCH HARD WORK ALL SUMMER FOR CITY OFFICIALS

This summer so far has been an unusually hard one on the city officials because matters pertaining to the building of the new airport and to streets and other affairs required so much attention and necessitated so many committee and special city council meetings, but after next Tuesday night's council meeting city matters are expected to simmer down to the usual summer routine and thus afford to the city administration as a whole a sort of summer vacation unless some unexpected emergencies arise.

At Tuesday night's meeting the remainder of the new airport contracts will be let some day or other pending matters will be discussed and acted on, including some adjustments in the new dairy inspection ordinance. So far as can be learned the matter of the city furnishing a water supply to the Berkeley or Midway section and the Oak Grove district is still up in the air, although both matters will probably receive further consideration at this meeting. Then, too, a number of city planning commission matters will be up for consideration.

However, after this meeting the present outlook is that all city business can be handled the remainder of the summer without the council holding special meetings.

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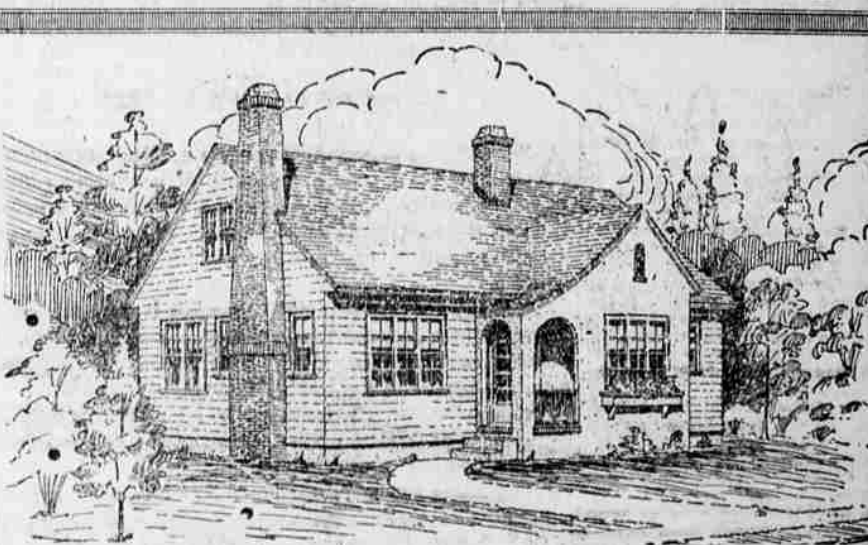
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
