EUGENE HI MAY GET EX-STARS OF OREGON TO COACH

The following item from the Corvallis Gazette-Times is of local interest, as perhaps the Eugene high school will fulfill its local championship. The last two years the Eugene school cancelled its games with the Medford high school. Manager is well known here as a football referee. Eugene has expressed a keen desire to play the locals this fall, as they are under the delusion they will be weak. Grants pass high, for the first time since 1922, desires to play Medford for the same reason. Both will be accumulated.

Games with Marshfield, Corvallis, and the Chemawa Indians, three schools who visited here in weak and strong seasons, will have the places of honor on the local schedule this year.

The article is as follows:

High school football in the Willamette valley has been in a slump for three years. The coaches have been mediocre in the person. Now comes the news that Shy Huntington may be coaching Eugene high, which has been a weak team. This is good news to lovers of high school football, and the valley newspapers are praising the good word along. Says "Curia" in the Salem Statesman:

Tumors are floating around the valley that Shy Huntington may take over the coaching job at Eugene high school, along with Street Manerud.

These two are in the first hand news together, and the idea seems to be that they could handle a little extra work after business hours without much trouble.

The story is supposed to be authentic even though it doesn't have the earmarks.

It has been conclusively demonstrated that Eugene high needs a new coaching deal. Not so much in the matter of tactics and fundamentals as in the more important realm, especially where football is concerned, of team spirit.

We don't know of any two young men who could handle the difficult job of coaching Eugene high spirit back to its erstwhile heights, as Huntington and Manerud. Both were stars at Oregon when that school had the best football team on the coast. Manerud made a name for himself as a quarterback when he weighed about 125 and had to match his cleverness against the weight and speed of full stars.

Shy had fighting teams when he coached at Oregon, and as clearly as we could see it out, his only difficulty was that the graduate coaching system wouldn't work under the conditions which prevailed at Oregon.

If these rumors be true and the proposal becomes an actuality, football in the Willamette valley will profit thereby. Eugene's slump has just about ruined the rivalry between the larger high schools in the valley.

With Halls Huntington back on the job in Salem, there would be one more firebrand against brotherly conflict when Eugene and Eugene met on the gridiron.

MISS JACOBS WIN TENNIS FINALS IN PELTING RAIN

SEABRIGHT, N. J., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Playing on a rain drenched court, Miss Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Cal., won the women's singles final in the annual Seabright Lawn Tennis and Cricket club tournament today, completely outclassing her fellow Californian, Miss Edith Cross of San Francisco, by scores of 6-1, 6-2. The match lasted but 22 minutes.

From the outset it was seen that Miss Cross, No. 2 in the national ranking, had little chance against the well-placed driving and fine volleying of Miss Jacobs. Miss Cross was able to win only three scattered games, the same number collected by Miss Marjorie Morrill of Denham, Mass., in the semifinal and by Miss Marjorie Gladman of Santa Monica, Cal., in the third round.

Miss Jacobs suffered the loss of 1 but eleven games but not a single set in her four matches.

Instead of showing up Miss Jacobs' game the pelting rain appeared to make it more dangerous. Her crisp drives slithered over the turf with a low, deceptive bound that had Miss Cross laming the ball outside or into the net for a total of 83 errors in the two sets. Miss Jacobs, on the other hand, made 49 misuses and in the difference by her superiority.

VANCE'S SHIRT IS ACCUSED BY CUBS

SHORTEN LEGION RACES, AND TEST SUIT DISCARDED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—(AP)—The American Legion horse racing program at the Gresham track will come to a close next Saturday night and in the meantime will not be subjected to official interference, Stanley Meyers, district attorney, announced tonight.

The announcement followed a lengthy conference between the district attorney and Legion and track officials today. The races were scheduled for 20 days and started last Wednesday.

The district attorney said that because the meet was to be abbreviated, he was not disposed to test the legality of the "contribution" system of exhibiting financial interest in the outcome of a horse race.

Two long shots came over in the first three races of today's American Legion meet at the Gresham track. A crowd estimated at 10,000 saw Washoe, Miss P. Palmer's brown gelding, lead a fast field to the wire in the second number to reward his backers with a \$21.20 refund on a \$2 donation. Minnie Meadows, 3-year-old bay mare, furnished the other upset to pay 19 to 1.
