elections in November has started and already much singing would be a polite phrase for the animosities evoked by some of the speakers. There are rumors, too, that a new candidate may appear. At present there are only two important nominees in the race, Pascual Ortiz Rubio of the national revolutionary party and Jose Vasconcelos of the anti-revolutionary party. There is little doubt attached to Ortiz Rubio's campaign, but Vasconcelos is the author of sensational charges and scathing denunciations, and when his speeches are printed in full there is at least abundant entertainment for the readers.

Whether there will be a "free election" as has been promised by the government, or "another imposition" seems to be the chief debatable point in the anti-revolutionist's view. He charges that the country has been subjected to "a wave of tyranny and corruption" and attacks the national revolutionary nominee as an "imposition" planned by "occult hands" to best suit the wishes of the United States.

The situation in regard to Ortiz Rubio is not entirely clear. It is surrounded by rumors and indeed by declarations made recently by General Calles himself, who indicated in concise terms that he was not satisfied with the manner in which the revolutionary party had conducted its affairs, strongly intimating that the method of selecting its nominee was not just what it should have been.

Any statement by Calles carries exceptional weight in Mexico, hence the rumors that possibly Ortiz Rubio will be awarded some time prior to the elections may be considered as a strong intimation that the method of selecting its nominee was not just what it should have been.

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
