BEACH ACCIDENT FATALLY INJURES STUDENT OF OSC

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP) Hubert Veltum, 22, of Eugene, a student at Oregon State college, was fatally injured on the beach near Waldport yesterday when the automobile in which he and Miss Fletcher, also of Eugene, were riding overturned. Veltum died 30 minutes after the automobile turned over when it struck loose sand. Miss Fletcher had several ribs broken. Veltum was the son of Robert Veltum of the Veltum & Cloy Iron Works of Eugene. The father, on being notified of the accident, flew to Waldport. The plane carried Miss Fletcher back to Eugene.

PAROLED CONVICT LOSES NERVE AND LIFE IN GETAWAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(AP) William Barry, a convict on parole, lost his nerve yesterday and was arrested. A short time later he recovered it and it cost him his life. Barry was paroled from the Joliet state penitentiary in January 1928, where he was serving time for robbery. Yesterday Barry was out riding in a stolen car. He lost his nerve when he saw a detective squad approach and sped away, attracting the attention of the detectives, who probably would have passed by without noticing him. In custody, Barry was recognized as a companion of "Red" Bolton, in whose West Side saloon Detective Sergeant Joseph Sullivan was killed several weeks ago. The policeman accused Barry of the slaying. "No," he protested, "you'll pin me down."

TOBACCO BARON LEFT ESTATE OF MILLIONS

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(AP) An abstract of the will of Bernhard Baron, millionaire tobacco magnate who died Thursday, indicated that his estate will be approximately 5,000,000 pounds, about \$25,000,000. About \$1,000,000 will be available for charity. The will directs the body be cremated and the ashes placed in an urn and deposited beside that of his wife in an obelisk at the Liberal Jewish synagogue at Willesden in suburban London. Small American and British flags are directed to be placed inside the compartment with the urn.
