

MELON PRICE ON PORTLAND MART REMAINS STEADY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP) Eggs, butter, poultry and fresh meats were unchanged. The long expected recession in the price of cantaloupes showed its shadow today with indications that the real decline would be along the last of the week. A few Yakima cantaloupes are beginning to come in. The Dalles was expected to add to this source of supply by Saturday.

Watermelons are holding steady. Tomatoes were getting plentiful and the price was weaker.

The East Side Market had an abundant supply of fruit and vegetables, but found a ready market for most of the products. Peaches were scarce at \$1.61-1.10; corn lower at six dozen ears for \$1.75, and tomatoes down to \$1.10. Blackberries had a slight decline at \$1.50-2.00. Apples were held at 20 cents. Other prices were unchanged.

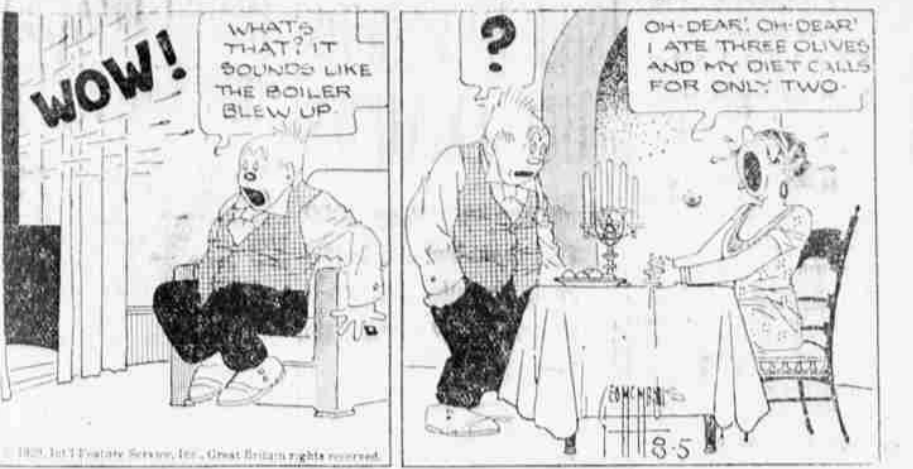
