PLAN COMMISSION "DEATH TREASURE" FAVORS EXTENSION BY EDITOR-JUDGE OF SOUTH CENTRAL STARTING MONDAY

Further action upon the proposed extension of South Central avenue from Boyd street, through the June Earhart property to the Pacific highway, will be taken tonight at the meeting of the city council following the unanimous passing of the proposal at the city planning commission meeting last night. Total cost of the extension to open up the traffic artery is estimated at \$9,199 by Fred Scheffel, city superintendent.

Property owners and business men at the meeting were heartily in favor of the project which calls for the purchasing of a strip of property belonging to June Earhart, and enables the street to join the highway at only a slight angle. The adopted route was chosen as more desirable than any others considered, Mr. Scheffel said.

By opening South Central avenue much of the traffic now on Riverside will be diverted and congestion will be lessened. Dr. E. D. Elwood, a property owner on the avenue pointed out the need of another through street to the south and explained briefly how Medford should take advantage of the present opportunity to get control of the property needed.
