WATER COMPANY OF GRANTS PASS RE-INCORPORATED

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 6.—(Sp.)—As soon as the Grants Pass Water company of Delaware returns to State Corporation Commissioner McCallister certain papers recently sent back to the company by the commissioner it will be qualified to do business in Oregon. The corporation department reports nothing irregular relative to the company. The company, the papers indicate, has acquired the properties of the Rogue River Water company. Recently it sent to the corporation department, for filing, its declaration of purpose to do business in Oregon, its power of attorney and information form properly filled out. It requested to send at the same time a certified copy of its articles of incorporation and amendments, so, on August 2, the department returned the papers that had been received with information that they could not be filed until the certified copy of the articles were on hand. In the meantime the company apparently had discovered the error and sent the required articles. The department now awaits the return of the declaration, power of attorney and information blank. The final filing will then be made.
