

PORT WORK WILL TAKE ALL OF BOND ISSUE

Engineering and Administration Building Contract Expected To About Clean Up Available Funds — Cost Report Rendered.

August 1, out of the bond issue, \$56,568.42 expended on the construction of the new airport, and the remaining contracts are for building the hangar and the structure next to it. The remainder will probably have been expended for the airport committee, Council J. O. Gray, chairman, and Superintendent Fred Schefel, who submitted to the city council last night, as to the progress of work during July, and the August 1, is as follows:

The drain the trenches have excavated along the entire length of the main trunk drain, the pipe has been laid and the trench is filled with concrete. Manholes have also been laid and covered. Surplus from the trenches was leveled the runway. The pipes were then sprinkled and the first course of concrete is now being placed. Work yet remaining to be done on the main trunk drain, the northeast portion of field, and when this is completed, the entire drain will be finished.

Work for the taxi strip and the hangar building, in foundation and construction for the basement is well advanced. Posts and buttresses for the hangar roof has the first floor on the west side of building in place. It is estimated to complete the roof by the 10th of August.

Work for the apron on the north side of the hangar is now under way. This work will be completed in about seven days. Mr. Gray has the general contract for the material ordered to start work on his part of the building on Thursday, August 8.

CRATER LODGE TO HAVE BIG VERANDA

CRATER LAKE, Ore., Aug. 7.—(Special)—The new veranda extending across the front of the Crater Lodge is fast nearing completion and according to the management a week should finish it entirely. When completed it will present a pleasing appearance to the visitor. It is constructed of large rocks cemented together in a wall about six feet high around the edge of the veranda, rising two feet above the floor. It also has a concrete foundation and at each end concrete steps go down to the promenade that winds along the edge of the rim. The veranda will allow quite a number to be seated comfortably.

One more improvement that deserves mention is the new lawn. Sodding of the lawn is well under way and grading of the numerous paths is partially completed. The whole of the large flat to the left of the lodge and on the left side of the protecting fence is to be sodded, and seeded this season. Short gravelled paths cut diagonally thru the lawn leading to the edge of the rim.

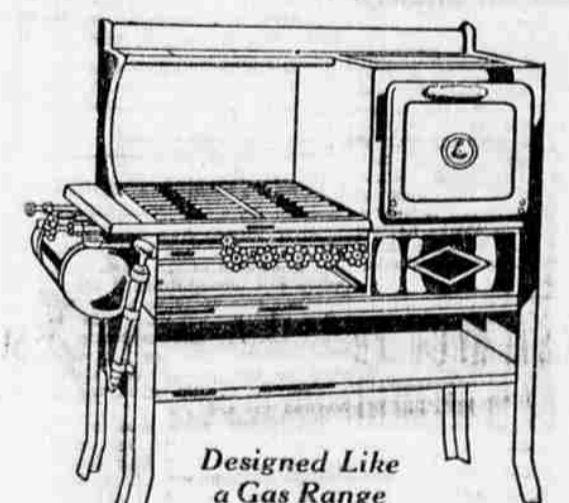

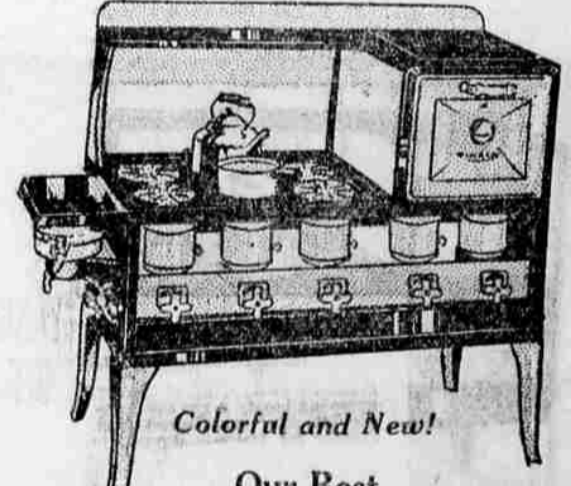

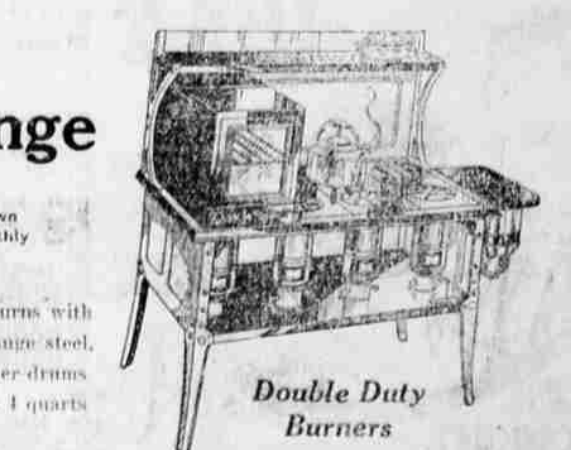
