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UNEMPLOYMENT WILL VANISH AS PICKING STARTS

With the beginning of the fruit harvesting season less than a week away, unemployment conditions in the Rogue River valley are expected to be on a steady decline. Many of the orchards expect to begin picking Monday and others will commence throughout the week. This will employ hundreds of persons.

There is considerable unemployment locally at present, Chris Gottlieb, superintendent of the United States free employment bureau, reports. This is caused by the many laborers coming here from California to work in the fruit houses and orchards. Mr. Gottlieb is receiving applications for jobs at the rate of 7 a day, he reports.

Although the labor supply is expected to be plentiful this season, there will be jobs for most every one wishing to work. About 2000 persons will be employed in Medford and throughout the valley during the peak of the season. This includes those employed in picking, sorting, packing, trucking and carrying on of the many other processes which take place in the harvest.

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OWEN OREGON TO FILL NEW ORDER FOR BIG TIMBER

Orders for seven more cars of timbers to be used by the city of San Francisco, in the construction of the Hetch-Hetchy water supply system were received yesterday by the Owen-Oregon Lumber company. This makes a total of 34 cars of timbers that have been ordered by the local concern for the huge enterprise, and more are expected.

The timbers are all certified by an inspector of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, and are of high structural grade.

The inspector said the timbers are the highest grade and type he has seen in many months, and that out of the cars shipped to date, he discarded but one timber as not being up to AA specifications.

Manager Owen said today that he was "highly pleased with the compliment, and glad to know that the trade was recognized at last the superiority of southern Oregon fir." He said that complaints were "very substantial" and that "were air-tight and left no room for doubt."

The timbers will be used in tunnel work.

The Owen-Oregon company recently filled timber orders for the state highway commission of Texas and the city of Stockton, Calif., for repairs to their water system.

In these dizzy days when jangling jazz seems to reach into every part and parcel of life, it is refreshing to get an excellent and careful entertainment which has for its musical motive more of the drowsy tinkling of cow bells in the distant meadows than of raucous fanfare of xylophones in the "The Rainbow Man," now playing at Hui's Craterian theatre, is an all-talking and singing screen romance, plentifully supplied with instrumental music which contains not one note of "blues" or "voodoo."

But the fact that it defies the great American jazz tradition is not alone the reason for recommending "The Rainbow Man." It is first of all a real human story, simple, but true and plausible. In the second place it contains acting of a high caliber in the hands of everyone in the cast.

Eddie Dowling is a small-time minstrel man who adopts the little boy, Frankie Darro, after his father, George Hayes, is victim of a vaudeville accident. Marian Nixon is the daughter of a small-town hotel proprietor. She falls in love with Dowling while his troupe is playing her town.

The plot goes forward through sunshine and tears and comedy, seasoned with episode drama, until finally the lovers are joined in a touching scene wherein the rainbow of their romance comes shining through.

The melodies of the production, "Rainbow Man," "Smile, Little Pal," and "Sleepy Valley," are of a pleasing quality, reminiscent of "Honey-moon Lane" and "Log Cabin of Dreams."

Here is a sound film romance which justifies the "talkies." It is one of the best screen entertainments this reviewer has ever harbored to or beheld.

WHISKEY PEAK IS SCENE OF BLAZE OVER 300 ACRES

A forest fire of much extent in an old burn in the Applegate territory broke out yesterday noon in the Whiskey Peak section, to which fire fighters were rushed from various road camps of the Crater National forest.

The last heard from this fire at the Crater National forest office here late this forenoon was that it had covered an extent of about 300 acres in an old burn of 1916, but no information had come in as to whether it was under control or extinguished. However, it was presumed here that it was under partial control at least, as the forestry fire fighters, who were unable to reach the scene last night because of having to pack in six miles from the nearest road, had reached the scene this morning and lines were established around the fire.

The origin of the fire was not known here.

The smoke banked in the south end of the valley today came from a big fire that has been on for several days in Klamath county.
