

RUSHING MEN TO CHECK BIG FIRE NEAR APPLIGATE

While no direct information from the big forest fire of over 300 acres in an old burn of 1916 in the Appligate district, which started Wednesday noon, and at which the forest service now has 65 men at work, had been received at the Crater National forest headquarters at press time, various lookouts have judged from the smoke situation there today that the fire is practically under control.

In addition to the 10 experienced fire fighters sent from various road camps of the service to the scene and who arrived there yesterday morning, the headquarters

office here sent 25 additional volunteer fire fighters gathered up on the streets of Medford, the additional crew leaving the city at 3 p. m. yesterday on trucks and arriving at the scene last night.

A truck load of large mules of the forest service kept at the Flash Lake road camp were also dispatched yesterday afternoon on a big motor truck from Medford to the scene of the fire, and arrived there last night. These mules will be used to pack in supplies to the fire fighters.

The mules were brought from the Flash Lake road camp under their own motive power to the city water intake, where they were loaded onto a big forest service truck and rushed to the Whiskey peak fire.

Hugh B. Rankin, supervisor of Crater National forest, is in charge of the fire fighting, having gone to the fire with the first crew of fire fighters. Early this afternoon, because no direct news had been received from this fire since it started, Norman White, assistant supervisor of Crater National forest, left on a hurried motor trip

LOST MEDFORD BOY FOUND IN J'VILLE

Hugh Ferguson, 19, missing from his home at 614 Clark street since yesterday morning was found in Jacksonville this morning, police report. He said he had gone there to visit some friends and stayed there over night with them.

When he was reported missing yesterday it was not certain if he had just come visiting or had run away. Police started searching for him and enlisted the local boy scouts to help. It was through their efforts that he was discovered this morning.

D'AUTREMONTS IN DANGER OF GOING BLIND IN PRISON

According to members of the sheriff's office, who have visited the state prison at Salem recently, the DeAutremont twins, Ray and Roy, are wearing dark glasses—evidence of possible blindness—the fact that Roy in his confession said he feared, and the prompting motive that led him to participate in the bloody Skidgou Tunnel holdup, in the hope of securing funds for eye treatment by specialists.

The eyesight of the twins has been failing since they started serving life terms, and dark glasses deprives them of the privilege of reading—one of their hobbies—and the greatest solace known to prison life. Their affliction also prevents them from chess games, at which they are adept. Chess, because of its length and time-killing qualities, is a favorite amusement at penal institutions.

The eye trouble of the twins is not serious or acute, but such an ailment requires medical care. They have long been subject to eye trouble.

Oscar Dumford, county jailer, on his last trip to Salem, saw Hugh DeAutremont, the younger member of the DeAutremont family. He saw him as he was marching into the dining room for the noon meal. He was called from the line, and talked with Dumford, who describes him as "no longer young, and hard as the next one."

NEW RECORD FOR CRATER L. TRAVEL LOOKS CERTAIN

Travel to Crater Lake continues to be on the increase, an average of 415 cars, carrying 1447 people from all parts of the nation and even from foreign countries, arriving each day for the past two weeks. This number is nearly doubled on Sundays by the local week-end vacationists. Last Sunday the attendance at the lake arrived in 952 cars, and 400 noon luncheons were served in the new cafeteria, in addition to the dining room at the lodge also having a capacity business. The popularity of the cafeteria is attested by the fact that since it opened a short time ago an average of 300 meals have been served there daily.

Inasmuch as the season closes on September 20 next, the indications are that if this increased attendance over last year continues, the record-breaking attendance of last year, 112,600, will be exceeded.

Up to August 4 this season the attendance was 61,562 persons, against 58,504 at the same time last season, and 19,617 cars as against 17,867 for the same period last season.

Fishing is a popular sport at Crater Lake this season. Every day finds fishermen, both on the narrow shore and far out in the lake, hook and line ready for a strike. The largest fish caught this season was a 28-inch rainbow trout. The average length varies from 15 to 18 inches. One man caught the limit by using grasshoppers instead of artificial flies.

According to veteran fishermen, the shallow water around Wizard Island yields the greatest rewards for the least effort.
