

GOLD MEDAL FOR SEAMAN CLAIMED AFTER LONG WAIT

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—(AP) The bulletin board at the Seamen's Church Institute is a sort of international newspaper for the men who follow the sea, so when John Maxim, able seaman, arrived from foreign parts he headed there as a matter of course.

Running his eye over the hundreds of items which in brief told tragic stories of missing men and missing ships, Maxim suddenly was halted by an item of more personal interest.

"There is a gold medal in the chaplain's office awarded to Seaman John Maxim if he will call for it," it read.

Mentally sketching his past, Maxim went to the chaplain's office where he learned he had been sought as a hero for almost five years. The medal, awarded by King George of England through the British board of trade, was in recognition of his part in the rescue of the crew of the British brigantine, *Thames*, on Dec. 23, 1924, when he was boatwain on the steamship *Springfield*. The board had despaired of finding him and had forwarded the medal to the institute.

NUN DISCOVERS KEY TO FRESCO

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(AP) A chance discovery by a nun while conducting research for a doctor's degree has revealed the identities of five historical figures in a Florentine chapel fresco.

Sister Mary Aquinas, O.S.D., head of the English department at Rosary college, it was announced today, has found the key to a fresco painted by Andrea di Bonaiuto about 1363, which has been a mystery to scholars for centuries.

The figures represented were identified by Sister Mary Aquinas as the Renaissance writer, Boccaccio, Sir Edmund Le Despencer, an English knight of the Garter, the crusader Peter I. of Cyprus and the Count of Savoy, and Piero degli Albizzi, a prominent Florentine contemporary of the others.

FOES OF FASCISM SWIM TO LIBERTY

PARIS, France, Aug. 9.—(AP) Francesco Nitti, nephew of the former Italian premier, and two other prominent members of Italy's suppressed political opposition, have escaped the fascist prison life of L'Alpi, and have made their way to Paris.

Anti-fascist circles here today acclaimed the escape, related in widely published stories, as the greatest inspiration given their movement in months. Accounts of their imprisonment were welcomed in these circles as revealing tactics employed by the fascist regime in checking growth of the opposition.

Escaping with Nitti were Carlo Rosselli, former professor of political economy at the Genoa institute, and Emilio Lussu, war hero, four times decorated by the Italian government.

FARM BANK LOANS AT HIGHEST RECORD NOW

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 9.—(Special) R. J. Venables, general counsel, announced that the Federal Farm Bank of Spokane, which operates over the states of Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Washington, has reached a highwater mark in its history in loans to farmers with \$25,000,000 worth on the books.

Four hundred stockholder corporations embracing 33,000 farmers of the Pacific northwest are participating in the operations of the Federal Farm Loan bank for this region.

The loan rate of 2 1/2 per cent, according to Mr. Venables, is reflecting a direct annual saving to the Pacific northwest agriculture of around \$2,000,000.

Since 1925 only 30 foreclosures on farms have been negotiated and these were disposed of at a profit.

GIRL STUDENTS SAY ATTACHE TOO FRESH

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP) Accused of annoying high school girls on buses and street cars, Frederick Dagonet Kellogg, Livorno, socially prominent attaché of the foreign service division of the state department, was at liberty today under \$1400 bond after being held by police for more than 24 hours.

Nine charges of simple assault and two of assault with a deadly weapon, were placed against the 32-year-old defendant, who gave his occupation to police as that of "clerk." Complaints from girls or their parents had been coming into the department for several weeks before he was arrested, police related.

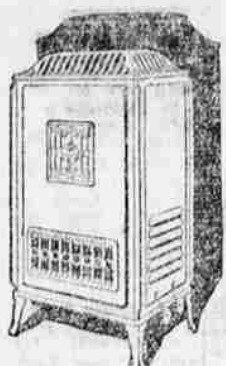

She was overcome by the smoke and was found dead near the altar by firemen who arrived after all the other inmates had been saved.
