

PLAN CONSIDERED TO BUY A PLANE LIKE AUTOMOBILE

NEW YORK (AP)—The problem of marketing the projected production of between 4,000 and 10,000 airplanes this year has brought up the question of proper financing of purchases, which a committee of the Aeronautical chamber of commerce is seeking to solve. The committee is drawing up uniform time-payment legislation.

Just as the automotive industry found the time payment plan a great stimulant to sales, the airplane industry hopes to provide a sound means of financing for increasing sales on the deferred payment basis. Several airplane companies have been making sales on the time plan, financing them in various ways.

The action of the committee follows conferences in Washington between representatives of finance companies and William P. MacGregor, assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics, regarding the new airplane licensing system soon to be put into effect by the department.

Under the new licensing regulations, finance companies would be recorded as owners of planes bought on the time-payment plan, but would not be subject to any fines imposed by the department of commerce for violations of air traffic rules.

A cooperative agreement is being worked out with the department whereby the government would notify finance companies of applications for the licensing of airplanes on which time exist. Planes must be re-licensed when they are sold by owners. This would enable finance companies to "ground" planes that repossessed for violation of contract.

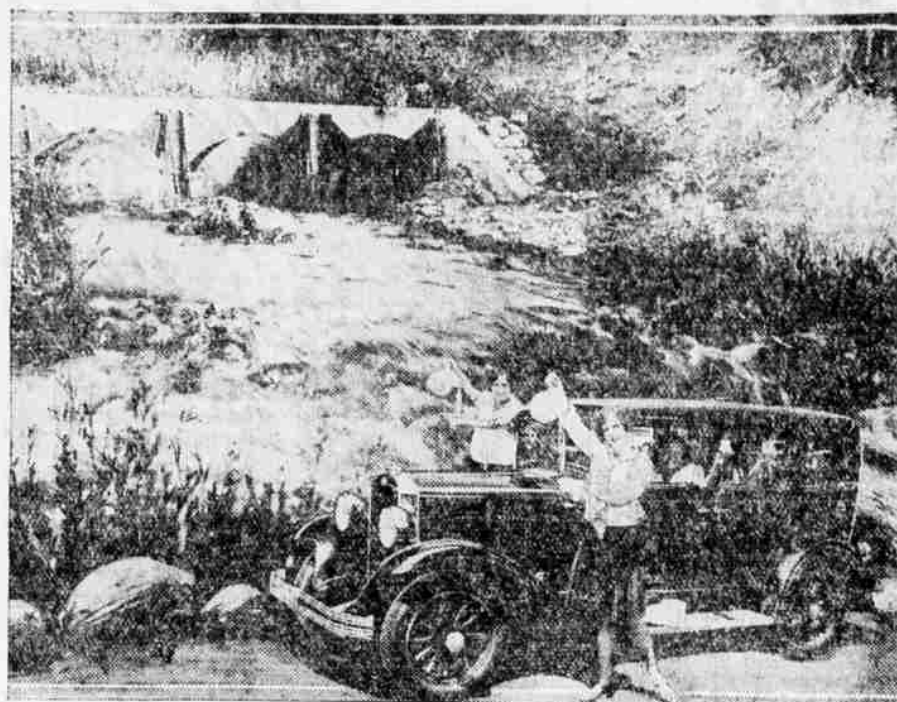
ALL-WHITE COSTUME LEADS FOR EVENING

WIFE RUNS FARM WHILE MATE ACTS UPON FARM BOARD

NORTHFIELD, Minn. (AP) While her husband goes to Washington to assist in working out the program contemplated in the congressional farm bill, Mrs. William P. Schilling will stay as manager of their Spring Brook farm, 220-acre tract near here.

Schilling is the dairy industry's representative on the board. He is well known as a breeder of Holstein cattle.

Mrs. Schilling often has supervised the farm with her herd of more than 100 cattle, as her husband frequently has been away in the interests of the Twin City Milk Producers' association of St. Paul, the largest dairymen's coopera-

tive organization, and he has been in demand as a speaker at farmers' gatherings.

But this time she will be in control, as Schilling intends to devote all his energies to the farm situation.

William P. Schilling, Jr., 26, will be his mother's chief aid. Tami, three is Lewis, who attends St. Olaf college here, and Joel, in high school, and three unmarried daughters. Two daughters are married.

"My first duty is my home and my place is right here at Spring Brook farm," Mrs. Schilling said. "The boys are doing wonderfully well, but they are not quite ready to take over the complete management of this half-section."

"Of course, I'm pleased and proud of the confidence in Mr. Schilling expressed by President Hoover in the appointment," Mrs. Schilling went on, dropping her household duties for a few minutes.

"Mr. Schilling has made betterment of agriculture his life work and this new responsibility will offer him a broader field of service."

"At the same time it will mean a sacrifice for him and his family

for he will have to give his full time to his duties on the farm board and will have less for his family and his private farming interests."

"But that seems to be the nature of public service in which there is an element of duty to be performed. Our family loves the farm. If Mr. Schilling's service in Washington means that he will be able to make a further contribution to the betterment of agricultural life in our country, his wife and sons and daughters are happy and proud that he is able to give it."

Farm Notes

Geese can be raised much more cheaply than ducks because they use green feed instead of grain during the growing season, but ducks lay more eggs in a season and are often slightly more popular on the market, says the Oregon experiment station.

To insure fertility of goose eggs five to seven ganders are necessary in a flock of 20 geese. A goose will lay from 20 to 30 eggs a season if not allowed to set, says the Oregon experiment station.

Exclusive use of stimulants for poultry tends to increase the number of eggs with blood clots, commonly due to hemorrhage of the ovary. If tools are receiving customary ration and giving normal production with only an occasional bloody egg, attempts to counteract it are not advisable, according to the Oregon experiment station.

Codling moths of the second generation are now on the wing and eggs have been deposited. The eggs may be expected to hatch by the middle of August, reports the Oregon experiment station, and advises that the next cover of spray be applied before that time.

In Oregon stands of clover being raised for seed can often be more economically handled and cleaner seed be produced if the grower will take a heavy hoe and spend time in the field cutting off large weeds, such as bull thistles and China lettuce, says the experiment station.

JEWISH STATE IN SIBERIA PLANNED FOR TRADE LURES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.

The largest Jewish state in the world is soon to be created in the Biro-Bidjan district of far Eastern Russia according to recent news dispatches. Biro-Bidjan, or Bikh-Bidjan, as it was once known, lies in the Amur River region north of Manchuria, China. It is in southern Siberia.

"Not long ago every geography textbook presented Siberia as a dreary, treeless waste fit only for exiles," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society. "The very name 'Siberia' conjured visions of long lines of prisoners moving across black tundras, their ranks being decimated by wolves and bears and the whips of their taskmasters."

"Nothing could be farther away from the reality of Biro-Bidjan than this vision," the bulletin continues. "The Amur Province in which it is located is larger than France and contains almost as varied scenery as the United States, with the exception of the semitropical southern States. True, there is one height, somewhat bleak plateau, but there are also so many fertile plateaus in the region. Marshy lowlands extend

with tall wooded ranges and treeless plains with magnificent forests. Much of the scenery along the Amur River may achieve notoriety for its wild beauty when the country is better known to the world at large.

"So it is perfectly true a rich variety of the region. Often for months during the winter there will be no snow at all, although the temperature is seldom higher than twenty degrees below zero. The short summers are comfortably warm."

"There are rich agricultural districts in the province and gold is mined extensively. Coal has not been mined so much but there is an abundant supply. The forests are filled with game, bear, tiger, wolf, moose, wild deer and wild goat. There are lakes in a novel way. A kid or a dog is tied to a stake at a spot on which a gun is trained by him. The hunter conceals himself behind some foliage and pulls the trigger when the three appears on the scene. The natives make pipes out of which they play a note resembling the cry of a kid when they hunt mountain goats."

"Siberian Plumbing. 'Amur Province has one large city, Khabarovsk, the 'City of Gold Diggers' with a population in excess of 55,000. It has wide streets and some modern buildings. Practically all the houses of Khabarovsk are made of wood, some being elaborately carved and others ornamented with large brass or iron angles of wood nailed on the front of the house at regular distances. The stores in the houses are built into the wall from the floor to

the ceiling. As the front is flush with the wall they look like decorative panels with their highly colored glass in various designs."

"The Siberian likes to wash his face and hands under a thin trickling stream of water and usually carries a kash or cup. In some times will be found a heavy receptacle hanging on the wall and ending in a handle of the bottom so the visitor can wash under his desired trickle."

"The Amur River, which separates the Amur Province from Manchuria, can only be navigated about six months a year. In winter, when it is frozen there is much sledging by sleds, heavy sleds, and all of it under customs supervision. In the summer the river forms colorful pictures with their fringe of white sand beaches and brilliant foliage and flowers."

STILES AND VEGETABLES FOR DAYTIME PANAMA

PARIS (AP)—The difference between daytime and nighttime Panama is about 12 inches white in the trousers, legs, according to present style standards.

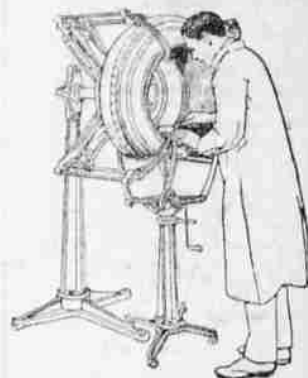

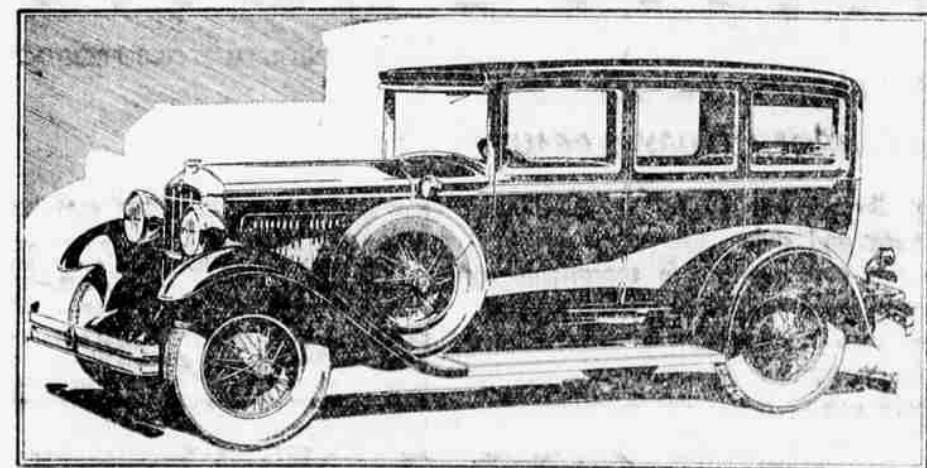
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
