## OUT-OF-DOOR COOKING SCHOOL PROVES VERY PLEASING TO WOMEN

That the ladies of Medford and Southern Oregon were pleased with the novel idea of holding the course of cooking lessons out of doors was proven by the large attendance at the first day's lesson, held at the children's playground on West Main street today, under the auspices of the Southern Oregon Gas corporation and the Mail Tribune. With Miss Victoria Warner, dietitian, in her trim white apron, as teacher, a complete out of door kitchen has been erected and equipped with a Tappan gas range, kitchen cabinet, tables and every convenience desired. Comfortable seats are arranged under the shades of the trees. A short musical program was given prior to the lesson in modern cooking by the Palmer Music House on a Victor electrical, and the large number of ladies attending were highly pleased with the enjoyable and profitable afternoon. It was the first of a series of four cooking lessons to be held from 7 to 4:30 p. m. closing with a big day on Friday. Miss Warner's lectures are pleasingly informal and are not only for those just learning to cook, but every expert in this line will find something to interest her in Miss Warner's lectures and demonstrations. Miss Warner delights her hearers by her charming personality and the pleasing way in which she gives instructions on every phase of cooking. The dietitian tells her audience to be free in asking any questions they desire on any phase of cooking. During the lessons Miss Warner illustrates her talks by cooking various things and, at times, has a whole meal in the process of construction. The school is really a series of lectures on home economics and modern kitchen methods, which every woman who is a housekeeper will be intensely interested in hearing. There is plenty of parking space for automobiles and every courtesy possible will be shown those who attend by a number of Boy Scouts.

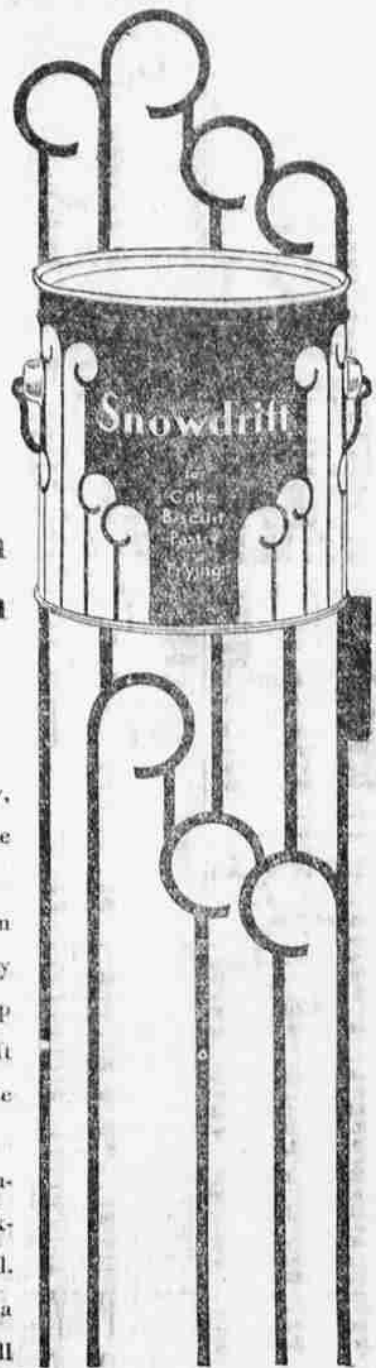
**The Bright Side.**  
On the bright side of the picture is judged out the preparations Chicago is making for the world's fair set for 1933. The city has no available land for a site for the big undertaking and has begun the construction of an island in Lake Michigan, not far from Soldier's Field, Grant Park and the Chicago Museum of Art. Construction of the island is well underway and it is planned to cover an extensive area. Work is being completed on the new Chicago Opera house, the tallest building in the city, and construction is just midway on the new Marshall Field building, 24 stories high, over a block square, planned to have the most floor space of any structure in the world. A new building of 40 stories is

planned but construction has not been begun. The largest baseball crowd of the season and the largest that has ever been in Wrigley Field attended the closing game this week between the Cubs and Brooklyn, the Cubs losing, 5 to 4, following close playing throughout the game, including four double outs by each team and a home-run by Rogers Hornsby, Chicago's baseball hero. A crowd of 34,000 people was estimated to be present, exclusive of baseball fans who were on roofs of buildings and houses on the other side of the 12-foot wall on two sides of the field. Members of the Goodrich Silver Fleet, who were in Medford several weeks ago and later seen in Iowa, South Dakota and Wisconsin, were the honor guests of the Cubs, who presented the auto drivers with a cub bear as mascot for the remaining 12,000 miles of the 22,000-mile trip. Paul Hells which went into the crowd never came back and 15 or 20 fans went home with souvenirs of the game.

The program for Chicago, as suggested by a newspaper, has five points: Make Chicago first city in the world, start the subway, electrify the railroads, abolish the smoke pall, grade separation on through streets and boulevards. ERNEST ROSTER.

### Merger Places P. O. Crawford at Head of \$50,000,000 Corporation; Rostel Calls at Chicago Office

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 8.—(Special Correspondence.)—Located on the sixteenth floor of an office building at 22 West Monroe street, Perry O. Crawford, former well known head of the California Oregon Power company at Medford, was yesterday found to be one of the busiest men in Chicago. Coming here as the head of the American Public Utilities corporation, Mr. Crawford, less than two weeks ago, was made president of the Federal Public Service corporation, as the result of the merger of two electric power concerns, expected to have a capitalization of \$50,000,000 in a comparatively short time. Last week Mr. Crawford was called to Minnesota, where the corporation has extensive holdings, and until Sunday he will be in Iowa in connection with power interests there. Later he is to leave for Pennsylvania, Louisiana and other middle western, southern and eastern states. The offices of the firm occupy the entire sixteenth floor of the building, located in the heart of the Loop district.

**Gangland on Vacation.**  
Murders and gangster shootings in Chicago are reported to have been few during the past summer, but holdups and robberies are still plentiful. Yesterday \$20,000 was realized by a group of machine-gun robbers, who paid a midnight visit to a food-house. Two days before \$10,000 was taken from a downtown hotel. Last night, jewels valued at \$10,000 were reported missing by a society woman. Bootlegging of intoxicating beverages is said to be increasing, and prices of moonshine whiskey are declared to range from 50 cents a pint to three dollars.

**Saloons, some of which make no effort to mask their identity, are said to be in all parts of the city. A few weeks ago one place was raided in the basement of a store building on the north side, and shortly after the operators had paid the fines, the basement being padlocked for a year, the saloon was reopened on the ground floor. Vacated a short time before by a grocery store. The entrance doors have a resemblance to those used in old time saloons, and peering through dirty, smoke smudged windows, a long line of toppers, completely crowding the bar can be seen.**

**Police Arrested.**  
Some Chicagoans still speak of the notorious police station on the north side, where a few months ago the entire force, with the exception of a captain, were arrested for misconduct in office. Local newspapers told of the arrest of a local house runner by the police, who confiscated his load of whiskey and immediately began to con-

sume in inviting their friends to join them and selling the surplus to others. The booze runner, upon his release from jail, enlisted the aid of federal officers, and had the entire force arrested. The officers at the height of the party damaged the arrested man's car, and the city was forced to purchase the booze runner a new Packard.

**High Mortality.**  
Although they were given no publicity, as in the case of numerous murders, 28 funerals for men of Little Italy in one month were reported held a short time ago. War between rival bootleg gangs is blamed.

There are four main liquor gangs in Chicago and are said to be located on the north side, west side and south side, with two in the latter section, including the gang reputed to be led by Al Capone. Competition among them is said to be high, and shooting always results when one gang overlaps the territory of another. Hijacking is also reported to be a profitable business, and booze trucks are said to be relieved of loads nightly. The victims, of course, have no recourse to the law, and must be content they escaped with their lives.

The garage in the north side of the city, remembered for the part it played in the St. Valentine day murders last February, is now doing business as usual, after having been closed for sometime. The police are still puzzled and the popular belief is that killers dressed as policemen were hired by a rival gang and with machine guns snuffed out the lives of seven, all recognized as being connected with the "booze" racket. The garage was said to have been used principally as a place in which to repair booze running trucks. Murdering activities are expected to begin in the fall and early winter. It is said a murderer may be hired for \$50.
