DALLAS CANTS ON PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP) Delicious yellow meat cantaloupes from The Dalles made their appearance today at the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association. They found ready sale at \$2 a crate.

With turnips scarcer, the price went up to 25 to 30 cents a dozen bunches.

Local tomatoes were less abundant and were held at 85 cents. Beets were cheaper at 4 cents.

Strawberries struggled to the market at \$1.50 for half a crate of 12 boxes.

Raspberries were held at \$2.35 to \$2.40.

New potatoes went down to 2 cents.

Loganberries were offered at \$1.25 to \$1.40.

Peaches dropped to 85 cents. Trade was not as active as usual.

Wheat moves up on frost report

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—(AP) Frost threatening damage to the remnants of the Canadian wheat crop boosted the wheat market today in lively fashion. Freezing temperatures in Canada were announced officially. There was also indication that export purchasing of North American wheat was in progress, and the Liverpool market rallied sharply from an easy decline.

Wheat closed unsettled 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 net higher, with corn 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 up, oats 3/4 to 1 3/4 advance, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 10c.

INCENDIARY SETS TEN MORE FIRES PLEASANT CREEK

Ten more small forest fires were discovered in the Pleasant Creek district north of Rogue River last night, local forest service officials announced today. This brings the total of fires in that district in the past two days to 25, all of them believed to be incendiary.

Forest lookouts at stations throughout southern Oregon were warned today to be on the alert this evening as weather forecasts show two electric storms passing the district. One from the northwest and another from the southwest. Electric storms are the direct cause for many of the forest fires at this season.

Reports received at the local office this morning said that most of the fires in the Pleasant Creek country had been put out. Only two were said to be still burning and they are small ones. The fires reported last night were on the east side of Elk mountain near Jump-Off-Joe creek.

A blaze covering approximately 150 acres was reported burning today on Grates Creek in Josephine county. A large fire in burning today in Klamath county south of Parker mountain. Wood from the lookout station on Mt. Pitt said that a column of smoke from this fire could be seen rising thousands of feet in the air.
