

# SCOTLAND YARD WATERHOLE IS SEEKING TWO IN FEUD BASIS IN MAYFAIR CRIME LAKEVIEW AREA

### Pair Believed Guilty of Assault on Harvard Professor's Son—Victim In Hospital Badly Slashed and Beaten.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Scotland Yard, which is seeking for the assailant of Philip Eaton, 27, wealthy young American teacher who was found beaten, cut and badly lacerated in his fashionable Mayfair apartment last night, has sent out a call for two young men.

The yard announced that Ronald Bateman, aged 22, was wanted in connection with the Eaton case and that Moore, also aged 22, who was believed to be with Bateman was sought for questioning. Photographs of the men will be issued tonight.

Eaton, understood to be the son of a Harvard professor and identified as teacher at the exclusive St. Mark's school for boys in South-bury, Mass., was found beaten, cut and badly lacerated in his fashionable Mayfair apartment yesterday. Position of the suspiciously furnished apartment indicated a furious struggle had taken place.

He was on the hospital danger list today, with his condition extremely critical and unchanged. He has recovered consciousness but once since brought there yesterday, and then only for a few minutes, sufficient to tell police a damning involvement tale of two men attacking him, one striking in his chest and slashing him with a razor until he became unconscious.

Although three suits of Eaton's clothes were missing and about \$500 (about \$600) had been taken from him, police were reluctant to believe robbery had been the only motive in the attack. Eaton was a man between 23 and 26 years of age, shot or stature, probably 5 feet 4 inches, with dark hair and always well dressed.

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# BODY OF GIRL FOUND TIED IN A GUNNY SACK

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Tied in a gunny sack, the body of a girl apparently about 12 or 13 years of age, was found in South Minneapolis today. Her hands were bound and she apparently had been strangled.

Police Captain Elmer Jonsson said the slaying seemed to be the crime of a meron. The child, he said, apparently was lured into an automobile, attacked and slain. Her body was found in sacks, held together by a wire.

Police started a search for a middle-aged man seen loitering about the neighborhood of the Ames home for several days. Sylvia Aune, a sister of Dorothy, told police she had seen the man several times, driving around and trying to entice girls into his automobile.

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# LEEVE BREAK AT SAN MARCIAL IS LATEST DISASTER

SANTA FE, N. M., Aug. 14.—(AP)—The levee at San Marcial, N. M., broke this morning and as the flood waters of the Rio Grande raced through the gap all the buildings in San Marcial with the exception of the Harvey hotel and the Santa Fe depot were swept away.

SOCORRO, N. M., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Flood waters which yesterday wiped out Ashtab and inundated San Marcial, New Mexico towns, were receding today. Both cities were believed to be out of further danger, barring rain.

The American Red Cross had workers here today, ready for any emergency, and the state department of health had a large crew at work in the stricken area cleaning up debris. More than 20,000 acres of farm land between Socorro and San Marcial was covered by the flood waters.

No loss of life was reported.

# HEENEY FAVORITE OVER ARGENTINE

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The Vittorio Campolo-Tom Heenev fight scheduled for ten rounds for night at 126th field was postponed until tomorrow night because of threatening weather. Humbert J. Fugazy announced the postponement after the men weighed in. Campolo scaled 223 pounds and Heenev 204.

# SOUTHERN OREGON SHOULD BOOST AS UNIT, LIONS TOLD

### Age-Old Controversy Flares Anew Between Cattlemen and Homesteaders—Feeling High When Fence is Ordered Cut.

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Lake county, one of the few remaining frontier outposts of the western country, now faces that age-old controversy that has always preceded the crowding of cattle from open ranges by the march of population toward the westward shore. It is the controversy between open range cattlemen and homesteaders.

The Wagonfire Mountain district is the scene of this latest issue threatening a range war. As in other days, plainmen and cattlemen here resent appearance of the homesteaders whose presence must surely mean fencing of the plains.

On the other hand, homesteaders are indignant over attempts of the cattlemen to usurp the great ranges for use of their herds.

The controversy flamed yesterday when it was learned that the justice court in Lakeview upheld the action of a state humane society officer in cutting fences around a homestead owned by Frank Dooling, that the cattle and horses owned by ranchmen might have access to the water on Dooling's ranch.

Feeling among homesteaders is declared to be intense. The Wagonfire district is one of the few remaining frontiers where open ranges and open water holes prevail.

# LAKE TRAVEL FOR SEASON PROMISES TO BREAK RECORD

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Aug. 14.—(Special)—Above the sweltering heat of the valleys, over roads winding thru forested areas, extending toward the crest of the Cascades and finally arriving at Crater Lake, the stream of 962 cars, carrying 2584 visitors, broke all travel records into Crater Lake national park for any single day in the history of the park, on Sunday, August 11.

Of this number, 861 cars entered through the Anna Spring station, which serves as the main entrance to the park from both Medford and Klamath Falls. With the completion of the new checking kiosk in the center of the highway at Anna Spring, the handling of increasing travel into Crater Lake national park will be accomplished in a shock-like fashion, and relieve a situation which in the past has been a source of inconvenience on the part of the park visitor and the checking ranger.

The two new drinking fountains constructed at this point, serve to the thousands who check in here, the cold, pure water from the famous Anna Spring, which bubbles out of the earth within 100 feet of the station.

The total number of cars visiting the lake during the week ending August 10, 1929 was 2196, compared with 2927 for the same week in 1928. Twenty-two thousand cars carrying 71,240 persons have visited the lake so far this year, which is an increase of 1278 cars and 2149 persons over last year. The per cent of increase is 6.1 for cars and 3.2 for persons. If visitors continue to visit the lake the rest of the season at the same rate they have so far this year all attendance records will be broken.

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# PROFIT TAKING IN SHARES IS BRAKE ON BULL FORCES

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Further violent "bullish" movements in an impressive assortment of leading issues on the stock exchange today ran into heavy profit taking.

Third States Steel common was again hurled upward in feverish trading, rising 1/4 a share to a record price of \$24, only to encounter heavy selling and fall back below \$23. Likewise, Westinghouse Electric and General Electric shared \$14 and \$13.95, respectively, recording new record prices at \$229 and \$129, only to react and lose most of their gains.

Hoisting Valley was a spectacular feature, soaring \$4.50 to \$22.50, displacing its previous best figure.

Union Pacific, which sold up \$12 yesterday, was a weak spot today dropping about \$19. Dow Jones and Hudson lost more than \$8 and American Tobacco more than \$6.

The reaction was in the face of a drop in the call money rate to 6 per cent, the lowest since July 3.

Trading was of comparatively heavy volume, the day's transactions exceeding 4,000,000 shares.
