

# VICE AREA IN INDIANA MOPPED UP

### Hammond Mayor, Police Chief and 200 Men and Women Operators of Speakeasies Arrested—Al Capone Believed Head of Ring—Law Machinery Declared Broken.

HAMMOND, Ind., Aug. 14.—(AP)—Girls of school age, a mayor, police chief and men and women operators of speakeasies were among the 200 persons arrested last night and early today as federal prohibition agents mopped up what they termed the Calumet district liquor and vice ring.

By one o'clock this morning 162 persons had been arrested in East Chicago and Indiana Harbor. As rapidly as the prisoners could be taken to Crown Point for arraignment before a United States commissioner, the 259 arrests returned to the roundup.

Mayor Raleigh P. Hale of East Chicago and his chief of police, James E. Regan, were among the first arrested. Nick Subovich, catalogued as a lieutenant of Scarface Al Capone, and as one of the heads of liquor traffic in the Calumet district, also was seized. Federal authorities believe Al Capone, now in Philadelphia jail, is the actual head of the alleged Calumet liquor and vice ring.

Mayor Hale and Chief Regan were charged with conspiracy and a similar charge was made against Subovich, who was found in the Calumet district. In many places the agents found gifts acting as barmaids, and they were sent with the others to Crown Point for arraignment.

Mayor Hale was elected nearly four years ago and took Regan from the Chicago police force to head his law enforcement department. The two men were released.

# CLAIM DEATHS FROM ALCOHOL ARE GROWING

### Association Against the Prohibition Amendment Give Out Latest Statistics—Deny That Drinking Is Confined to Upper Class.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—A mounting death rate from alcoholism and increased alcoholic insanity are pictured in charts published today by the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment in a pamphlet presenting a statistical study of the entire prohibition period in the United States.

These manifestations, it says, are accompanied by evidences of increased production and consumption of illicit liquor. Its charts and tables of growing intemperance being based on indices accepted by both wet and dry partisans as valid.

The alcoholic death rate is described as "almost up to the pre-war level" having shown "a steady rise" since 1920 after having declined sharply prior to and during the first year of prohibition. Citing similar experiences in foreign countries, it attributes "the sharp drop in 1918 and 1919" to war conditions and that in 1920 to prohibition.

Statistics of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company covering 15,000,000 policy holders, it says, "do not bear out" the contention that "drinking has been confined entirely to the wealthy, while among the working population of the country drinking has practically disappeared." On the contrary, it holds, "the rate from alcoholism among the industrial population parallels the alcoholic death rate for the entire country."

Although it says that figures covering arrests for drunkenness are inadequate and conclusions may be misleading, the association interprets figures available as giving the "impression that the number now exceeds the level of 1914. A graph of arrests for drunkenness in 38 large cities from 1914 to 1927 supported this by showing "the same characteristics as the curves for deaths from alcoholic insanity."
