

SPEEDER CROWDS AUTO INTO DITCH WOMAN UNINURED

Four women narrowly escaped injury when the car in which they were riding was crowded from the Crater Lake highway two miles north of Medford this morning at 10:30. Their car went over the bank about seven feet and turned over in the mud and water of an irrigation ditch. The passing car failed to stop.

The car which was forced to leave the highway belongs to and was driven by Mrs. Jack McDonald of Portland. Others in the car at the time were Mrs. D. V. Kellison of Medford, sister of Mrs. McDonald, and Mrs. Inabell Low and Marjory McDonald of Portland.

It was some time after the accident before the women could get out of the overturned car. They finally climbed out through a rear window. None of them was hurt. It was impossible for them to get the license number of the speeding car which caused the accident.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 15.—(AP)—A supposedly "dud" artillery shell proved a disastrous plaything here when it exploded and sent three children to the hospital, one with serious injuries. The injured children are Gene Kieseling, 8; Harold Kieseling, 12, and Edward Kieseling, 16. They are the daughter and sons of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Kieseling of Chehalis. Part of Gene's right foot was blown away by the blast and her condition is critical. The two boys were less seriously hurt. The shell was given to Edward by a playmate. He attempted to pound out the detonator with a chisel and hammer and it exploded.

WOULD SUMMON G. O. P. LEADERS TO GRAND JURY

BOSTON, Aug. 15.—(AP) Former Mayor James M. Curley today declared that he would seek to have national leaders of the Republican party summoned before the Suffolk county grand jury in an effort to obtain a criminal indictment against Louis K. Liggett, Massachusetts member of the Republican national committee. Curley indicated that Frederick Howser might be included among those he would ask to have summoned. Curley today visited the office of District Attorney William Foley to ask permission to go before the grand jury and testify concerning statements made by Liggett about Curley's activities in the last presidential election. He declared that there was "not a word of truth" in charges made by Liggett that Curley, a Roman Catholic, was responsible for the circulation of anti-Catholic literature during the campaign for the purpose of damaging the Republican party here.

False Report of Bank Run Starts Real Bank Crash

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—False rumors that there was a run on the Bay Ridge Savings bank in Brooklyn today started an actual run on the bank, and by noon hundreds of depositors had rushed in to draw out their money. Warned in advance by the false rumors, officials had time to prepare. In a big armored truck they brought over \$1,000,000 in cash they had in the vault of the Brooklyn Trust company, and they hired nine extra tellers, making a total of 17, to take care of the crowd. The 17 tellers handed out money as fast as they could.

TOURISTS' CAR UPSET ON ROSEBURG HIGHWAY

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Charles Bramwell of Chicago was injured last night when a fire blew out on his automobile, causing it to overturn. Dr. Bramwell, his wife and chauffeur were pinned beneath the car. His chest was crushed, but his condition had improved today. Jim Allen, a truck driver, narrowly escaped death last night when a brake chain broke as his heavily loaded truck was descending a steep grade near the Coos county line. As the truck gathered speed Allen turned it against the bank and the sudden stop caused the logs to shift and crush him against the steering wheel. His chest was bruised and one leg cut.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP) The Cubs set a new major league record today by signing a player just thirteen years old. He is "Red" Solomon, manager and third baseman of the New York Kiwanis club team. Walter Hoyt, signed by the Giants in 1915 at the age of sixteen, previously was the youngest major league recruit.

OVERBECK AND COOKE TO PAY 20 PER CENT

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Creditors of the bankrupt brokerage house of Overbeck & Cooke today had expectations of receiving 20 cents on the dollar. A. M. Cannon, referee in bankruptcy, authorized J. G. Gillingham, trustee, to sign on behalf of the creditors a release under which Logan & Bryan, New York brokers, will pay the estate \$250,000. About 95 per cent of the creditors, whose claims aggregate \$1,750,133.70, signed the release.

MRS. JACKSON LEAVES FORTUNE TO FRIEND

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—(AP) A "beloved friend," Zola P. White, was left all but \$5 of the \$200,000 estate of Mrs. Dorothy S. Jackson. It was shown today in a petition for appointment of executor filed in circuit court here. The \$5 was bequeathed to Philip L. Jackson, publisher of the Oregon Journal, the husband from whom she won a default divorce decree July 2, last. Mrs. Jackson drew her will on July 4. She died August 7 at the age of 29 years.
